Other Tammany officials who were making ready to move this morning were Daniel Engelhard, the mayor's marshal; George B. McClellan, president of the board of aldermen; Sheriff John B. Sexton; Coroners Shea and Shultz; Recorder Smythe, and Judge Truax, of the Superior court.

Mayor-elect Strong will take possession of the mayor's office at noon tomorrow. There will probably be a little speech-making, and Col. Strong will be introduced to the heads of the departments who will serve under him until a mayor's power of removal bill is passed.
