

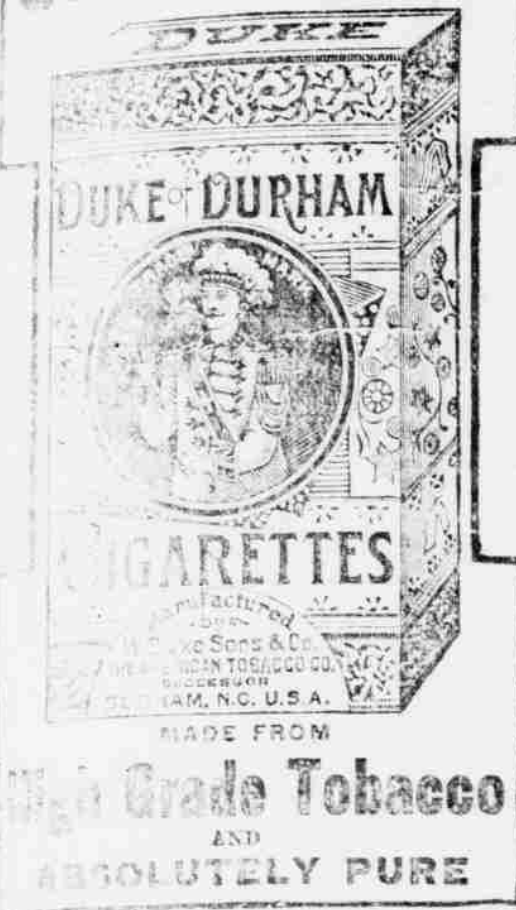

OUR SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

SESSION AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

Interesting and instructive sessions at both meetings—A good attendance Sunday night—The Sunday Schools and Attendance.

Reports taken in the Sunday school were going on in our little town as manifested at the meeting of teachers and Superintendents Sunday afternoon and at the conference proper Sunday night at the First Presbyterian church.

At the afternoon meeting Rev. W. C. Alexander and Messrs D. B. Collins, Robert L. Duval and B. E. Harris in short talks expressed their views as to the most successful way in which Sunday schools should be conducted, all of whom offered practical thoughts for consideration. It was decided that the Superintendent of each school should appoint delegates to attend the county convention, to meet at Bethpage on August 22. No reports were read. At the night meeting the church was crowded to its utmost capacity. Mr. B. E. Harris conducted the service. Mr. Z. B. Morris, of the Presbyterian Sunday school, was the first speaker, and in his talk he referred and laid special stress upon the importance and duty of educated people to assist in the noble work. In his talk Mr. Morris brought out some interesting points.

When Mr. Morris had concluded his text was Mr. L. D. Duval, superintendent of the great work in the Concord Sunday school at Cannonville, who made a brief talk, in which he showed the responsibility resting on the individual Sunday school worker. His talk was instructive and can be applied to all parts of the Sunday school movement.

Rev. Dr. Hoy, the returned missionary to Japan, addressed the congregation and told of the great Sunday school work going on in that foreign field and of how successful the missionary work was progressing. The meetings, both in afternoon and at night, were successful ones. The music by the selected choir was splendid, and a special feature was the rendition of a solo by Miss Gertrude Robbins, of Statesville.

The attendance of the regular

Sunday school service fell off considerably Sunday. There was no Sunday school at the Baptist church. The attendance this week was 198 less than last week, the full attendance being 820 and the total enrollment reaches 1,631 scholars. The table following will show where the attendance declines:

A HORRIBLE AFFAIR.

The Little Town of Huntersville Has a Suicide—A Man Comes all the Way From Georgia and Dies Over His Sister's Grave—A Brother-in-law of Prof. McElroy.

A suicide, under very peculiar circumstances, occurred at Huntersville, Mecklenburg county, Sunday about 1 o'clock, the particulars of which we cannot get in full. Mr. J. R. Nash, who lives three miles from Huntersville, was in the city and tells the following distressing report of the horrible affair:

"Mr. Sam Silvenear, a native Georgian, came to Huntersville Sunday morning by private conveyance from Charlotte. He put up at Holdbrook's stable and told his driver that if he did not return by 2 o'clock that he should go back to Charlotte without him.

"He went direct from the livery stable to the church, where he sat down upon the steps for a few minutes. From the church steps he went into the graveyard, and after a few moments survey of his surroundings, he knelt upon the grave of his sister, the late Mrs. Prof. McElroy, and drew from his pockets two revolvers. He held one in each hand, placed the muzzles on each temple and pulled the triggers. He died instantly.

"It was a solemn although sensational death and it is evident that his intention was suicide when he came to the place.

"On his person was found letters addressed to himself and a purse, which contained \$22 in cash.

"The affair caused no little excitement in the little village.

"Silvenear's sister died about two years ago."

The above is about the conversation between the reporter and Mr. Nash. Mr. Nash was not positive about the man's name, but says the unfortunate affair is a sad reality.

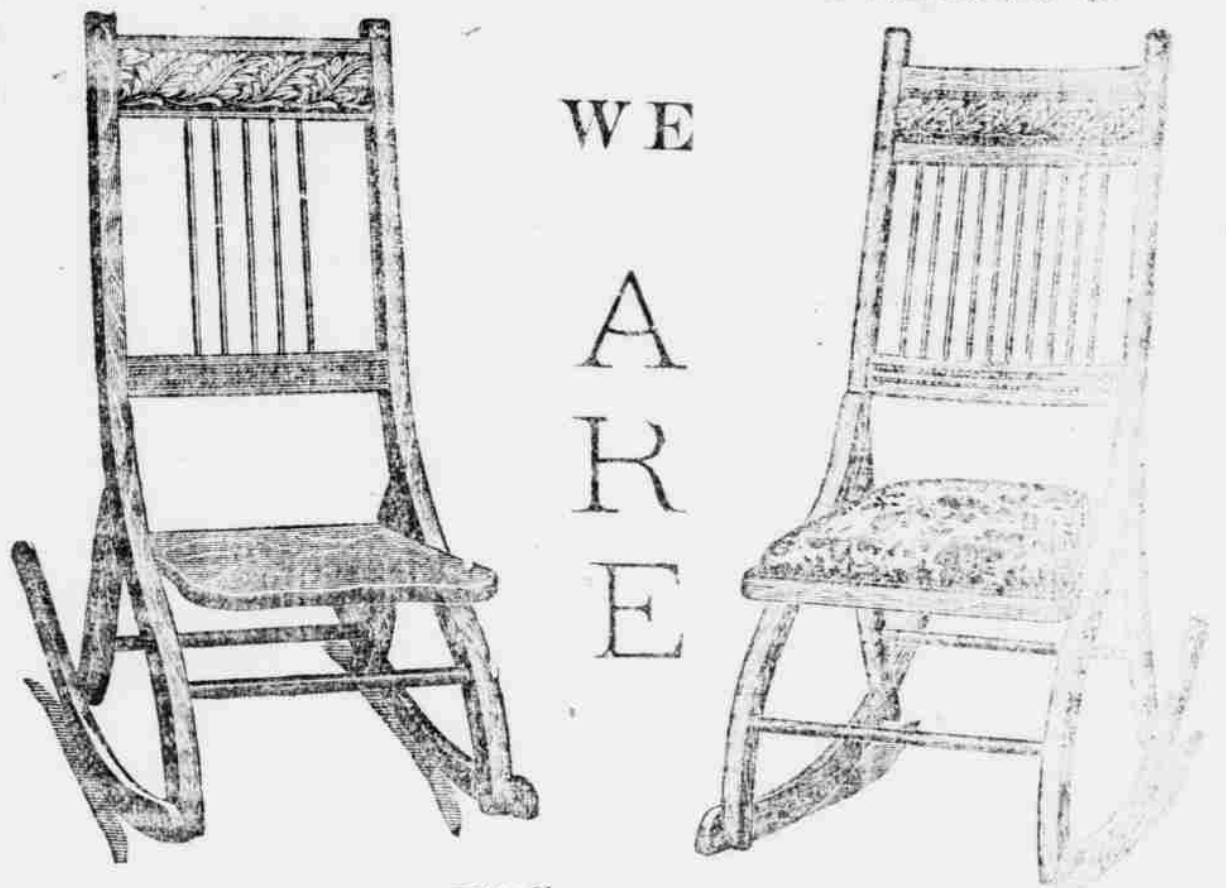

The Game Saturday.

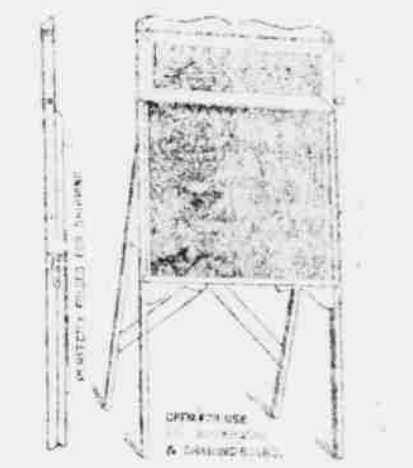
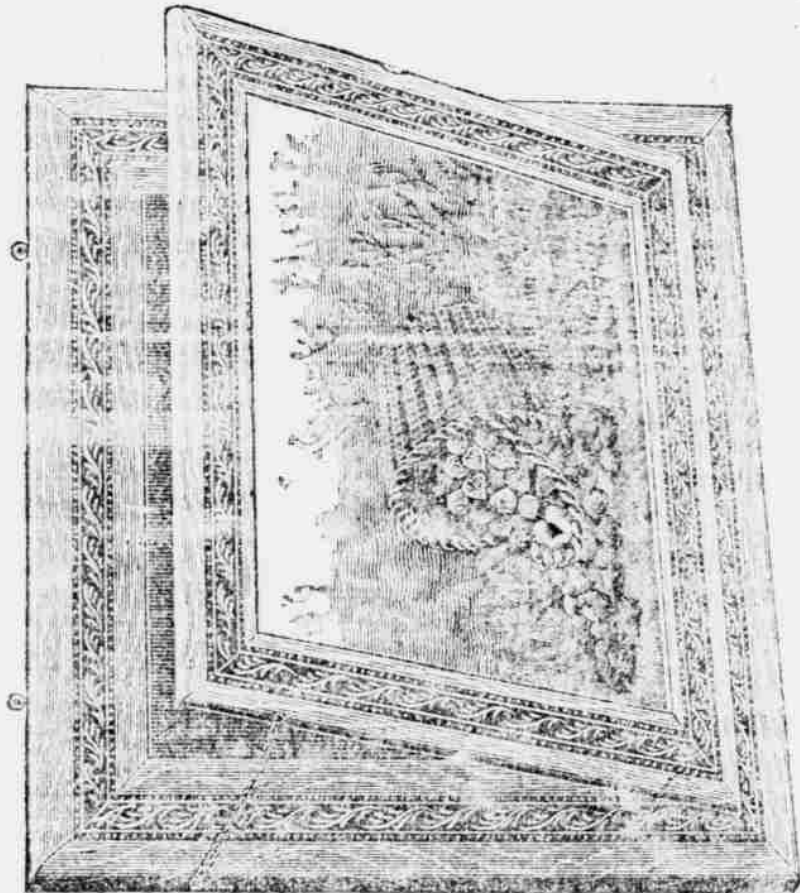

Another game is in progress this afternoon and it will not be a walk-over for either team. Salisbury or Charlotte could or would not come.

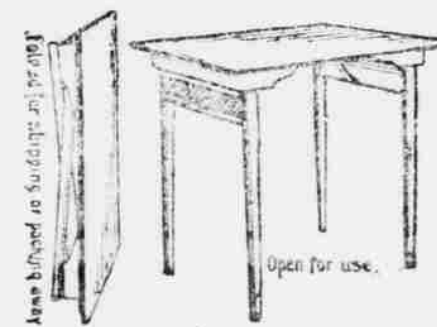
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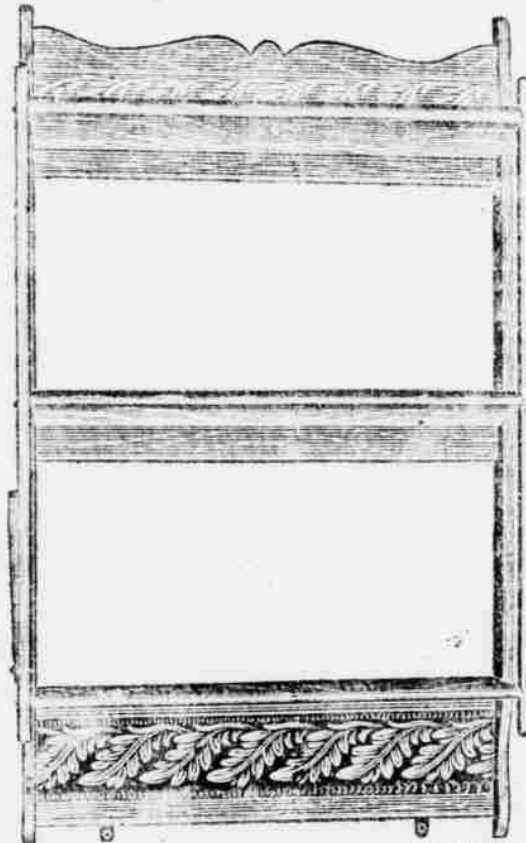


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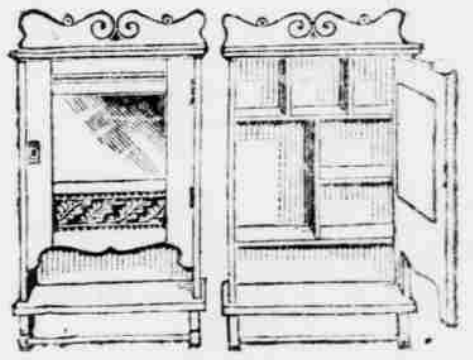
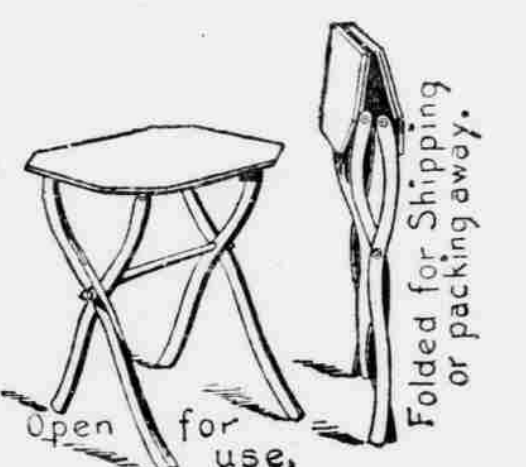
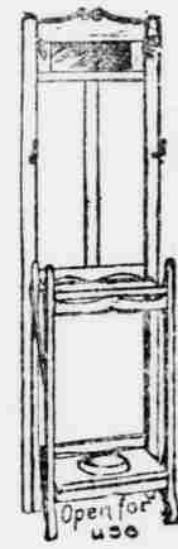
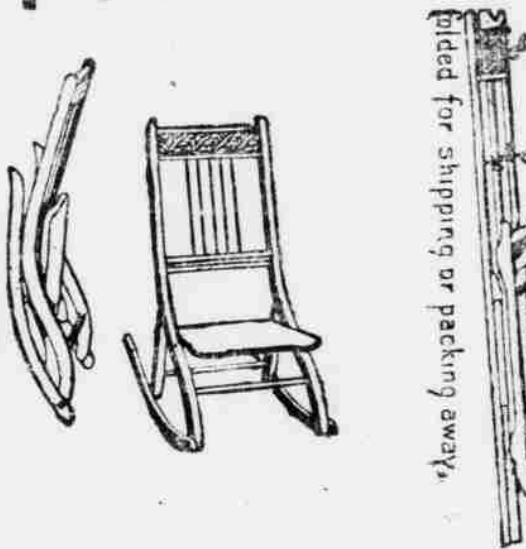
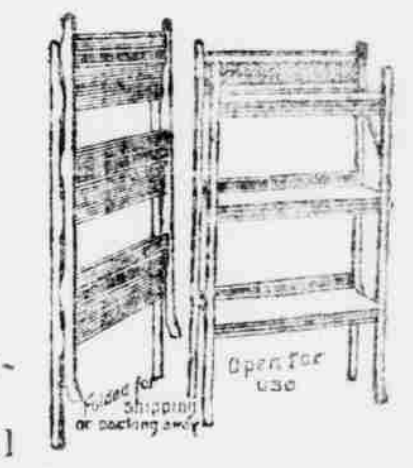
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
