And Now Second Crop Grapes.

THE STANDARD is pleased at receiving a quantity of grapes from its good old friend of No. 8. We cannot share the grapes with our readers but we will do better for them and copy the letter entire, showing the way in which the crop was procured. If Mr. Fink has found a way to prolong and lengthen out the grape crop he has added much to the value of grape culture:

EDITOR STANDARD: Enclosed you will find a sample of my grapes, they being the second crop of this year. About the middle of June I tried an experiment on my vine by cutting back several vines, leaving about three joints of this year's growth. In a short time came out two branches from each stump, which brought the second crop which are now ripe. The same vine has about fifteen or twenty bunches of good size, which are now about half grown. If Jackfrost delays his coming for some time they may get ripe, which will make three crops on one vine the same year.
