THAT ACCIDENT

At China Grove Yesterday—How It Occurred.

Our special correspondent sends us the following particulars of the accident which occurred near China Grove yesterday, which resulted in the loss of an arm to the unfortunate young man, and mention of which was made in THE STANDARD:

"A stranger, whose home is in Georgia, attempted to get on a slow-moving freight train in a cut a mile and a half above China Grove on Thursday morning about 10 o'clock and falling was thrown and one wheel ran over his left arm and so mangled it that amputation was necessary. Drs. Ramsaur and Stephens performed the operation. The amputation was above the elbow. He is much reduced from loss of blood, having walked about half a mile to Mr. John Ketchie's before he could receive any care. He stood the operation fairly well and his condition is hopeful.

"The young man was fairly well dressed and possesses marks of respectability and stated that he was short of means and was very anxious to get home and resorted to this means of stretching his resources so as to accomplish the end."

The young man gave our correspondent his name and address, with the request that it be withheld except in case of his death.
