Beat It If You Can.

Here comes the cotton record for our county, and one of which we can boast. We were told some time ago that a cotton record was soon to come, and Capt. Chas. McDonald, of our city, now has it for publication. Off of 6½ acres, Mr. McDonald has realized 11,843 pounds of cotton in the seed, which is an average of 1,822 pounds to the acre, and when ginned made eight bales. It will be remembered that not long ago we had a case where a man in the north-western part of our county made nearly a bale to the acre, but in this case there is an average of one and three-thirteenths of a bale to the acre.
