## A BLOODY DAY.

THE WINDOM RETURNS and REPORTS  
THE SECOND BOMBARDMENT OF  
CIENFUEGOS--CITY ABLAZE  
and FORTS RAZED--FOUR  
HUNDRED SPANIARDS  
and Two AMERICANS  
KILLED--MADRID  
CELEBRATING  
Her VICTORY.

President McKinley Receives Advices From Madrid That the Fleets  
Have Met at Porto Rico--The Americans Cut the Cable

—Manila Dispatch Admits That Dewey Killed  
Three Hundred and Wounded Six  
Hundred Spaniards.

### Celebrating the Victory.

Madrid, May 14, 10.45 a. m.—Everybody is jubilant this morning over the report of Sampson's repulse at San Juan and his subsequent defeat by the Spanish fleet. The day is being joyously celebrated.

### Fleets Have Met.

Washington, May 14, 11.05.—President McKinley received advices this morning from Madrid that the fleets have met near Porto Rico.

### Second Bombardment.

Key West, 11.45 a. m.—The Windom arrived this morning and reports a second bombardment of Ceinfuegos. The city is ablaze. The forts are demolished. The casualties are four hundred Spaniards killed and two Americans killed.

### One Killed and Six Wounded.

Key West, 11.46 a. m.—In the second bombardment of Ceinfuegos one man was killed and six wounded on the Marblehead. The Americans have cut the cable.

### An Evening With Omar Khayyam.

The Julia Magruder Club meeting of last Tuesday was made doubly interesting by a "talk" from Mr. E B Lewis on the Persian poet, Omar Khayyam. Mr. Lewis was most happy in his brief sketch of the man, and read several beautiful poems from the "Rudaiyat." In his clear and concise style he instructed the club on a book which we find is named the sixth in a list of "A Hundred Books for a Village Library" in the Bookman Year Book. Mr. Lewis held his audience spell-bound, and not till Miss Hill served her delicious refreshments was the spell broken and the tide of conversation resumed.

The hour arrived all too soon to adjourn to the court house yard, where the club went in a body to lay their tribute of flowers on the monument raised in loving memory of our Confederate dead.

It is an evening long to be remembered with satisfaction and pleasure by the Julia Magruder Club.

### Four Hundred Spaniards Killed.

Key West, 1:00 p. m.—The Americans landed at Cardenas and killed four hundred and thirteen Spaniards in the second bombardment.

### Three Hundred Spaniards Killed.

Madrid, 1 p. m.—Dispatches from Manila admit that Dewey killed three hundred Spaniards and wounded six hundred.

### Spanish Fleet at St. Pierre.

St. Pierre, 1 p. m.—The Spanish flotilla of eight war ships and seven torpedo boats have passed this point heading northwest.
