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LIST TAKERS AND ASSESSORS

Appointed at the Recent Meeting of the County Commissioners—The Road Petition With Its Bounds Handed In—An Admittance to the County Home.

As usual Monday was a busy day in Commissioner's room at the the court house. Besides the crowds that were awaiting the payment of their accounts there were a number of paupers waiting for their monthly amount to help them to live. All of their business was finished on Monday afternoon.

Alfred McEachern, of No. 10 township, who seven or eight months ago came to our county from Mississippi, and who is very poor, was given admittance to the county home.

It was ordered that Ex-Sheriff Buchanan be paid \$310, which amount was paid the State for indigent pupils, this being the payment for 1897 and 1898, the matter having been neglected last year.

The petition for the road in No. 1 township was presented showing the bounds of the proposed new road. The petition asks for a public road leading from Rocky River church to Concord, beginning at the well of J M W Alexander's land about 68 poles from Dr. Grier's residence and to run through lands of J M W Alexander and Emma Alexander, crossing Rocky river near the mouth of Back creek then through lands of C A Black, W H Heglar, Mrs. Hiram Bost, F A Archibald and L M Morrison to a point on present road at a bridge across a branch about one-fourth mile southeast from L M Morrison's residence. Publication of the petition was ordered according to the law on this matter.

Proclamation to the Philippines.

The Philippine Commission has issued a proclamation to the people setting forth the objects and purposes of the American government in the following articles:

1.—The supremacy of the United States must and will be enforced throughout every part of the archipelago. Those who resist can accomplish nothing except their own ruin.

2.—The amplest liberty of self-government will be granted which is reconcilable with justifiable, effective and economical administration and compatible with the sovereign rights and obligations of the United States.

3.—The civil rights of the Filipinos will be guaranteed and protected, their religious freedom will be assured and all will have equal standing before the law.

4.—Honor, justice and friendship forbid the exploitation of the people of the islands. The purpose of the American government is the welfare and advancement of the Philippine people.

5.—Guarantees an honest and effective civil service in which to the fuller extent practicable, natives be employed.

6.—The collection and application of taxes and other revenues will be put upon a sound, honest, and economical basis. The public funds, raised justly and collected honestly, will be applied only to defraying the proper expenses of the establishment and maintenance of the Philippine government, and such general improvements as public interests demand. Local funds collected for local purposes shall not be diverted to other ends. With such prudent and honest fiscal administration it is believed that the needs of the government will in a short time become compatible with a considerable reduction in taxation.

7.—The establishment of a pure, speedy and effective administration of justice by which the evils of delay, corruption and exploitation will be effectually eradicated.

8.—The construction of roads, railroads and other means of communication and transportation and other public works of manifest advantage to the people will be promoted.

9.—Domestic and foreign trade and commerce and other industrial pursuits and the general development of the country in the interest of the inhabitants will be constant objects of solicitude and fostering care.

10.—Effective provision will be made for the establishment of elementary schools, in which the children of the people will be educated. Appropriate facilities will also be provided for higher education.

11.—Reforms in all departments of the government, all branches of the public service and corporations closely touching the common life of the people must be undertaken without delay and effected conformably with common right and justice, in a way to satisfy the well-founded demands and the highest sentiments and aspirations of the Philippine people.
