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THE CONCORD PRESBYTERY

Opened Tuesday Night—Officers Elected—Committees Report on the Different Matters of Interest to the Presbytery—A Number of Calls for Ministers Handed In.

On Tuesday night the divine services were held in the First Presbyterian church by Rev. C Miller, of Rocky River. After this able and appropriate discourse the Presbytery opened for the dispatch of business.

Rev. Chas. F Rankin was elected moderator. Rev. J A Ramsey, D. D. and Rev. John Wakefield were elected temporary clerks.

The hours of business were decided to be from 9 30 a. m. to 12 m., from 2.30 to 5.30, and to commence at night at 7.45 and adjourn at will.

The morning service today (Wednesday) were conducted by Rev. J A Ramsey, D. D.

On account of the serious illness of his wife, Rev. J M Rose, of Morganton, failed to be here. A special prayer was engaged in by the Presbytery on account of her sickness.

A number of reports were handed in by committees to be examined and acted upon later.

The report as to the candidates in the theological seminary was read and referred to the Committee on Education.

Rev. J Rumples, D. D., Rev. J M Wharey, D. D., and Rev. W R McLelland were appointed as a special committee to consider communications on Mormonism and report to this meeting.

A call from Cleveland church was presented for Rev. Robt. S Arrowood, promising \$100 in quarterly payments for two Sabbath services per month. The call was placed in the hands of Rev. Arrowood.

A call was presented from Popular Tent church for the services of Rev. Geo. L Cook for one-half his time and promising \$300 per annum. The matter was referred to the ruling elder, Mr. I N Pharr, who moderated the congregational meeting, that he might attach his certificate.

A call was presented from Elmwood church for services of Licentiate J E Summers, promising \$65 per annum for one-fourth of his time. The call was placed in the hands of Mr. Summers.

In the absence of Rev. J M Rose, who is chairman of the committee on the Elders and Deacons Institute, Rev. J Rumples, D. D., reported, recommending that the Institute be not held this summer and that the committee be continued until next spring. The report was adopted.

A commission to organize a church at Cleveland was presented and after being read was adopted.

The treasurer, Rev. J A Ramsey, D. D., presented his report which was received by the Presbytery and approved.

The afternoon session was held at the Cannonville Presbyterian church, in order that the members of the Presbytery might see the commendable work of the Home Mission.

A popular meeting in the interest of Home Missions will be held tonight. The exercises will consist of addresses by a number of the ministers.
