The President's Jaunt.

President McKinley, accompanied by Mrs. McKinley and members of the cabinet with their wives are on a jaunt through the west. At Canton his niece joined the party. He expected to arrive at Quincy yesterday, where he was billed to visit the Soldier's Home and participate in the exercises arranged, arriving at Peoria in the afternoon where there was a dedication of a soldier's monument. He is booked for Chicago over Sunday. He will attend the reunion of the Blue and the Gray at Evansville.

Among other cities the President will visit are Minneapolis, St. Paul, Fargo, Aberdeen, Yankton, Milwaukee, Cleveland and Youngstown, Ohio. The party will leave the latter place Oct. 18, arriving in Washington the 20th.

Grand Monument to His Memory.

Mr. D. E. Converse who died recently at his home in Spartanburg, S. C., was president of five of the largest cotton mills in the State, founder of Converse college and a philanthropist, says an exchange. The college is a proud monument to him. His session this fall opened with five hundred students.
