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## WHERE THE WAR WILL BE

Our attention has been called to the fact that some of our readers, up-to-date in history and even ahead of date as pioneers of progress, have found their ideas covered about as thickly with the dust of oblivion as the lids of their geographical maps, and are trying to shake off the misty haze and locate the Boers. Well, most of these even remember in studying the map of Africa, that on the southern extremity they found Cape Colony; Griqualand, East and West; Natal; Sulu Land; Orange Free States and the South African Republic. This latter is the land of the Boers, and can be very easily traced on any ordinary map of Africa. The little divisions mentioned have been absorbed by the English nation except Orange Free States and the Transvaal.

In prospective war these two will band together, most probably, and if Great Britain be the victor a good large, well shaped, part of Southern Africa will pass wholly under British dominion. British territory, or at least land under British sovereignty and protection, now occupies three sides of these two republics.

In all the quarrels which are likely to end in human misery and bloodshed, every one feels at liberty, if not by duty bound, to fix his sympathies. In this whole history it seems the Boers have left one territory after another to avoid English rule, and yet, according to the English version, the republic has been practically rescued from disintegration by the British protectorate. Like all quarrels, there are two sides to the matter in dispute.

Since America gained her independence all American hearts go out toward those demanding to be let alone.

It must be admitted, however, that Great Britain's pioneering and her enterprise in apparently getting a claim on all the territory she can, has been a very great factor in the civilization of the world.

If it were not for this spirit of expansion how slow the world would be today, and how would the great reforms have been accomplished, civilization advanced and christianity carried to the uttermost parts of the earth, if the spirit of Anglo-Saxonism had not been one crying out and reaching out for new peoples and new lands to subdue, physically, morally and commercially?

In the early days of this great American Republic, this spirit of expansion was aroused, and the great territory within the home bounds was the result.

The civil war caused a halt, but when the declaration of war against Spain was heard, there was one people in spirit, united and determined for the success of the arms of the Republic.

The successful conclusion of the war, the new duties involved in its success, has aroused the expansion spirit of the nation, the desire to throw off its lassitude, and to seek to broaden its trade and commerce, and if need be shape any destiny for good which might threaten evil.
