FIGHTING JOE SPEAKS.

The Nashville Banner is authority that Hon. W. J. Wood received a letter from Gen. Wheeler, in which he says: "I am delighted with the Philippine islands. I have no doubt that a little push and energy this fall will wipe out the Aguinaldo insurrection. Out of 9,000,000 of people I do not think he has more than 20,000 soldiers and in a square fight 5,000 Americans would tear them to pieces. All that is necessary to crush them at once is for the army to get at them till the work is done. The evil features of the islands have been exaggerated to our people. The action of some of the people in the United States in asserting that the people of the Philippines ought to have independence does a great deal of harm and assists Aguinaldo in maintaining the insurrection, as he publishes all the assertions and tells his supporters if they hold out until winter independence will be given them."

It does seem that the evidence is cumulative, that the prevailing tones of sympathy for these revolutionary Filipinos and the caustic denunciations of our government in the Philippine affairs are not warranted in cause and are not politic in effect.

THE STORY AGAIN.

A Jackson, Miss., dispatch of the 6th, says:

"Hunter Johnson, a white citizen, while hunting in Pearl River swamp, east of the city, several days ago, discovered a box containing nearly \$50,000. The money was encased in an iron case and is in gold pieces, nearly all of them \$20 denomination. It is thought the money is a war treasure. All of the coins bear date prior to 1850."

Movements In the Philippines.

Stirring events seem about to be inaugurated in the Philippines and if lingering rains do not too much interfere the great forward movement may be looked for.

The Philadelphia Record says:

"The movement of troops from three directions against the decimated insurgent forces on Luzon Island may be regarded as the beginning of the end of organized resistance to Federal authority in the Philippines. Thirty thousand men, under Gen. Wheaton on the north, Gen. McArthur on the south and Lawton to the eastward, are closing in on the disintegrated army of Aguinaldo, which is now concentrated at a point about twenty miles of the Filipino 'government.' If this effort to trap the rebel leader shall be successful nothing worse than guerilla fighting will have to be done thereafter to assert and maintain the supremacy of American authority over the whole archipelago."
