MR COON VINDICATED.

No little interest has been felt in Salisbury's Coon fight and we clip the following from the Salisbury correspondence to the Charlotte Observer:

"The charges preferred against Superintendent Chas. L Coon, of the city graded school were investigated this afternoon by the school committee, composed

of Rev. Dr. J Rumple, Dr. J F

Griffith, Hon. John S Henderson,

Messrs. H J Overman, J M

Julian (ex-officio), Mayor S F

Lord and G W Wright. The

trial lasted from 3 to 6:30 o'clock

the principal charges being that

Mr. Coon had used language

abusive and unbecoming a gentle-

man and had spoken of parts

of the Bible in a manner calcu-

lated to unsettle the beliefs of

the children. The investigation

was held at the city hall and the

hearing room was crowded.

Many of the pupils and all the

teachers were examined, the lat-

ter all testifying strongly in fa-

vor of the accused. Prof. Coon

called but one pupil in his be-

half, those called by the prosecu-

tion testifying to different ef-

fects. All witnesses were ex-

cluded from the hall until called.

Mr. W H Burton represented the

prosecution. Mr. Coon con-

ducted his own case. It had

been previously agreed that no

attorneys be employed by either

side. Prof. Coon, in going upon

the stand as a witness, made a

very strong statement, evoking

hearty applause from the spec-

tators. He made no regular ar-

gument, nor did Mr. Burton.

After a brief executive session

the committee then unanimously

gave Prof. Coon a complete vin-

dication.

"The following statement was

made public to-night:

"Every member of the graded

school committee voted that the

charges preferred against Prof.

Charles L. Conn have not been

sustained. The committee states

that nothing has occurred to

weaken their faith in Prof.

Coon's character as a Christian

gentleman and an efficient and

capable superintendent.

CHILD BURNED TO DEATH.

Yesterday afternoon Margaret, the 6-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Shuford Miller, of Concord township, was so badly burned that she died about 9 o'clock last night.

The little one's clothes caught from the fireplace, while her mother was out. She ran screaming into the yard with the flames enveloping her. Her mother ran to her and the flames were extinguished, but not until she was fatally burned. Mrs. Miller's hands were badly burned in putting out the flames. Dr. T E Anderson was summoned, but he could do nothing for the little sufferer.—Statesville Reporter of the 9th.

Great presence of mind in such emergencies is hardly to be expected but many a child could be saved if rescuers would quickly as possible throw them flat while extinguishing the fire or tearing off the clothing.

Inhaling the flames is the fatal part in most instances and the child when running increases the flames but fans them from the face to some extent. They should be quickly thrown down when stopped.

"FITS TO A T."

The Hon. R Z Linney in his laboured reply to the Hon. Tom Settle says "In the dark hole of disloyalty to truth and patriotism I will imagine the following exchange of thought: Well Tom, we want a statute that will make certain our victory at the polls in all future elections."
