## Situation in South Africa.

What news we get from the seat of war in South Africa indicate that Ladysmith, though surrounded, is holding out satisfactorily. The Boers dare not make an assault on the city, and the English cannot drive off the Boers. Both use long-range heavy guns with fearful accuracy. Gen. White is reported to have made another sortie, in which he punished the Boers severely. It is said that the Boer commander, Gen. Joubert was killed on the 9th, but it is not confirmed.

Indications are that reinforcements will reach and save Kimberley.

## Life Insurance and Suicide.

The decision of the United States Court of appeals that suicide does not invalidate a life insurance policy unless it can be proven that the insurer contemplated suicide at the time of taking out the policy, is sound sense as well as sound law.

The lower courts have often held that the suicide clause is void because suicide is presumably an insane act, and no man can, by any contract, make himself responsible for acts that he may commit when insane.

Moreover, nearly all the policies in which suicide is made a cause for refusal to pay were taken out long years ago, for the reason that of late years this provision has not usually been included in life insurance contracts. On these policies of long standing the insurance companies have been receiving premiums for many years past. In perhaps a majority of cases the premiums, with accumulated interest, amount to as much as the face of the policy and in all cases to a considerable part of the indemnity promised. To refuse any return in such cases merely because, under some mad impulse, the policy holder has committed suicide, would be most unjust.

Fortunately, the point is now settled, and settled right.—New York World.
