No. 37 stops for passengers coming from Lynchburg or points beyond, and to take on passengers for regular stopping places south of Newells. No. 38 stops to let passengers from regular stopping places south of Newells and to take on passengers for regular stopping places, north of or beyond.

Nos. 33 and 34 stop at Concord for passengers to or from the C. O. & A. Division—Charlotte to Augusta—and other points in South Carolina, Georgia and Florida, reached through Columbia or Augusta.

Nos. 7, 8, 11 and 12 are the local trains and connect at Salisbury with trains of W. N. C. Division.

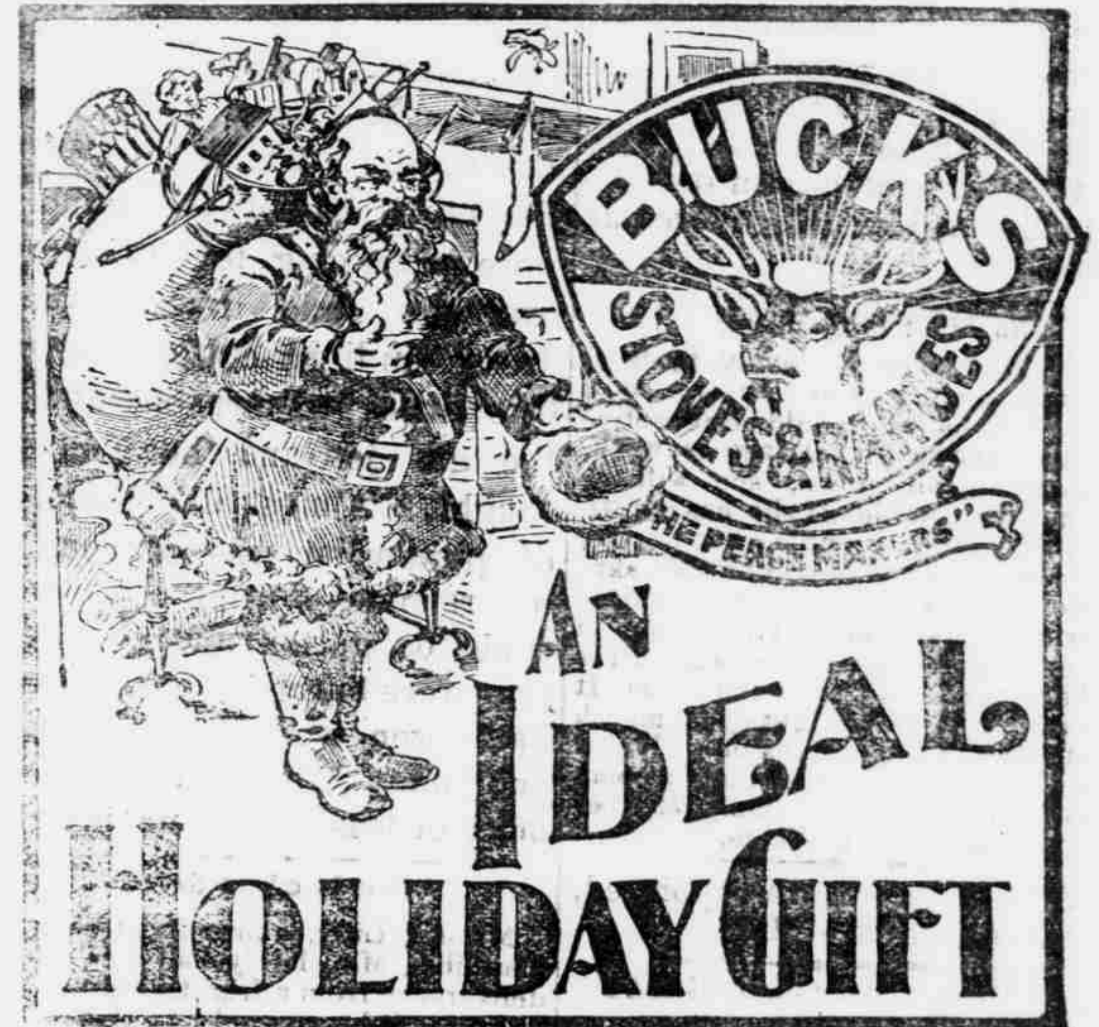

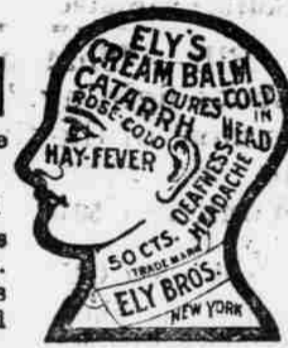
