## SMALLPOX SITUATION.

Dr. Lewis Says the Disease is Not Being Stamped Out.

The month of February has witnessed no change in the condition of the outbreak of smallpox in the State.

Dr. R. H. Lewis, the secretary of the State Board of Health, said yesterday that the disease had as strong a foothold as ever. During the month, new cases have been reported in Orange and one or two other counties. The outbreak in several counties west of Raleigh. Dr. Lewis said, is directly traceable to forces of hands working for the Postal Telegraph Company. They spread the disease in Orange. Dr. Lewis stated, and are now in Alamance.

"People over the state continue to diagnose smallpox as chicken pox," Dr. Lewis said. "The disease cannot be stamped out so long as such conditions prevail. Other names for smallpox, which some persons are even inclined to accept are 'elephant itch' and Georgia bumps." A physician in Eastern Carolina, who has a state-wide reputation; a few weeks since declared that a smallpox patient had elephant itch. Fortunately the county authorities took the advice of other physicians who diagnosed the case smallpox. Dr. Lewis stated yesterday that there is no such disease as "elephant itch."—Raleigh Post.

### Raleigh Has a Blaze.

Raleigh had a blaze Wednesday morning. A large tobacco prize house four stories high run by Mr. E. L. Fleming took fire and was consumed, together with the dwelling of Mrs. Geo. H. Williams.

The loss was something like \$30,000. Inadequate water pressure seems chiefly responsible for the loss. There was about \$23,000 of insurance.

### Protection Against Porto Rico.

The House passed the Porto Rican tariff bill on Wednesday by a vote of 172 to 161 imposing a tariff of 15 per cent of the tariff rates on similar importations from other countries. It is not in accord with President McKinley's former construction of the true relations of the islands to the rest of the United States of which it now seems a part, but with the proviso that the proceeds be applied to schools and public enterprises on the island, the President seems reconciled.

This maintains the Republican principle of protection and re-

lieves us of all fear that the cheap, unskilled laborers of the little island will disorganize the system of American labor by ruinous competition. Consistency with our constitution is another matter.
