CHINESE AFFAIRS.

Status as Seen and Summarized by the Associated Press.

The diplomatic situation in China is about the same as for several days and seems best expressed in the following dispatch dated August 31:

"The Associated Press has official authority for announcing that the American-Russian proposal in favor of the withdrawal of the allied forces from Peking, with the view of facilitating negotiations for the conclusion of peace, has not only met with considerable favor at European chancelleries, but it is almost certain to be adopted. In the meanwhile, the question of employing Li Hung Chang as an intermediary is meeting with more and more favor, and, as the Associated Press has intimated in recent dispatches, will in all probability be settled affirmatively as soon as Li Hung Chang is able to obtain the necessary authority.

"There is a growing conviction in official circles here that the withdrawal of the allies from Peking is the only practical procedure under the existing circumstances. There is, however, no doubt in official circles that it will be necessary for the powers to maintain their hold of the Taku forts and certain strategical points until satisfactory terms are arranged and ample guarantees given by China for her future good behavior.
