C. R., the eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Morgan, of Gold Hill, died Monday afternoon at the Concord Hospital, where he underwent two operations. The body was sent to Gold Hill Tuesday.

No session of the city recorder's court was held yesterday, no cases having been on the docket. Chief Tabiri stated that conditions in police circles have been quiet during the past several days.

The regular February meeting of the County Commissioners was held at the court house Monday. With the exception of the regular routine work, the board was not presented with any matters of unusual importance.

Four persons were tried in recorder's court Monday. One was charged with carrying a concealed weapon, and was found guilty; two were fined \$5.00 each for cutting corners in automobiles and the other was fined \$10 for an assault.

The funeral of Mr. R. W. Fleming, prominent farmer of the county, who died at his home in No. 3 township Sunday afternoon, were held Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock. The services were held at his late home, "Elmwood Farm," and interment was made in Oakwood cemetery here.

The Concord Y basketball team had an easy time Tuesday night in its game with the M. P. C. L. team. The locals won 49 to 21, and were leading at all stages of the game. The Cadets played a good game, however, and sent one of the best teams in recent years here for the game.

Miss Cathleen Wilson, county home demonstration agent, is continuing preliminary plans for the "Better Kitchen" campaign she will conduct in this county next month. Miss Wilson expects to begin the campaign about March 1st, and full particulars will be announced by her later.

The Trinity basketball team won from Davidson in Charlotte Tuesday night, the Methodists gaining the big end of a 39 to 27 score. Simpson was the star of the game with 17 points, with Maize securing 13 points for second honors. The game was witnessed by a large crowd, including a number of Concord people.

The venerable clinic, which has been underway in this county on Mondays and Tuesdays for several weeks, has been extended to include Saturdays, Dr. Buchanan stated this morning. This means the clinic will be conducted here three days in each week, and will extend the clinic from February 20 to February 24.

Supporters of the claim of Mr. Ground Hog are yelling "I Told You So," Tuesday, with the thermometer hanging around 23 degrees above here, and with many sections of the country buried under snow and sleet. There has been no snow here, but this county Tuesday experienced the coldest weather of the winter.

The county health department has not secured a successor to Miss May Stockton, county health nurse, it was reported this morning. Miss Stockton goes to Buncombe County on February 25th, and it is probable that her successor will be named by that time, as the health department is making efforts now to secure a nurse.

Someone tried to enter Calloway's Store Tuesday night, the police were informed this morning. A man living near the store heard the would-be thieves at the rear of the store, and telephoned the police. The men at the store evidently heard him call the officers, for when his phone rang they ran, and no one could be found when the officers arrived on the scene.

The members of Company E, Concord's military company, are getting ready for the annual inspection which will be held in the near future. The inspection will be made by a regular army officer and a member of the staff of the North Carolina National Guard and is considered very important. The local company made a fine impression last year, and another good inspection is promised this year.

Rev. R. M. Andrews, D. D., of Greensboro, financial representative

of the college fund of the Methodist Protestant Church, will be in Concord next Saturday night and Sunday in the interest of the college. He will make an address at the First Church here Saturday night, and will exhibit a number of pictures of the proposed college. On Sunday morning he will occupy the pulpit of the church.

Eight new cases of whooping cough were reported on yesterday to the county health department. Dr. Buchanan, head of the department, stated that he had reason to believe that a number of cases of the disease have not been reported to him, and unless the reports are made promptly, he is going to start an investigation to determine who is violating the law, which requires a report on all cases of the disease.

Last month was a very active one for D. F. Widenhouse, local prohibition agent, according to friends who have kept in touch with his work. It is reported that Mr. Widenhouse made 29 seizures, including two automobiles, 15 complete stills, 32 gallons of liquor and 5180 gallons of beer. He also made out cases against ten men, it is reported. During the month, it is said, Mr. Widenhouse worked in Cabarrus, Stanly, Montgomery, Anson and Richmond counties, his regular territory.

Announcement has been received by the local Kiwanis secretary that on Thursday evening, February 8th, from 8 to 9 o'clock the Kiwanis Club, of Montreal, Canada, has arranged to broadcast by radio the minstrel show portion of the "Kiwanis Frolics" recently put on by that club. The broadcasting will be done from the very powerful broadcasting station CKAK, on 430 meters wave length, and can be picked up all over Canada and the United States. All radio fans are invited to listen in on this program.

The County Commissioners have appropriated \$300 to continue the dental clinic in the rural schools of the county. The appropriation will keep Dr. Foster, who is conducting the clinic in the county another month, and will give the city and county schools the clinic for five months. Dr. Foster this morning began work at the Brown Mill school, this being the first rural school he has visited, and he will work among the rural schools for ten weeks, and then devote more time to the public schools in Concord and Kannapolis.

Lutherans at Salisbury Are to Build New Church.

Salisbury Feb. 5.—At a meeting of the congregation of St. John's Lutheran church Sunday morning it was unanimously voted that the congregation needed a new church and also that a canvass be begun for funds with which to build. A committee will take up the canvass soon. This congregation which is the largest Lutheran congregation in the state and the largest congregation of any denomination in the city has recently bought a lot in the center of the city, adjoining the Federal post office and upon this they propose to build a church and parsonage to cost around \$150,000.

INCOME TAX FACTS.

Number Seven.

Thousands of persons derive their income almost wholly from salaries or wages. Salaries paid by a State or political subdivision thereof as a city, town, county, or hamlet, however, are not taxable. The reason is that the Federal Government does not tax the instrumentalities of a State. In this connection many persons have the mistaken belief that all school teachers are exempt from payment of the income tax. Teachers are not exempt because engaged in educational work, but only when employed by a State or political subdivision thereof.

Public school teachers in the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii are not in the exempt class for the reason that they are not State employees, and their salaries, or part thereof, are paid by the Federal Government. The salaries of all Federal officers and employees are subject to the tax except that a Federal income tax can not be levied on the salary of the President of the United States nor a Federal judge which would diminish the salary that was in effect at the time they took office.

The special exemption of \$3,500 for persons in active military or naval service allowed under the revenue act of 1918 no longer is allowed. Soldiers and sailors in making returns of income for the year 1922 are allowed only the personal exemptions and credits granted a civilian.

A Georgia Verdict.

Charlotte Observer. That North Carolina leads the southern states in normal and healthy growth, and is rapidly forging ahead of many other states in the Union in return to prosperity, is the assertion of C. E. Shepard, of Atlanta, district sales manager of the Gulf Refining Company, here to attend a two-day meeting of the company's agents ending yesterday. About 40 representatives of the Gulf Refining Company were here as guests of Kelly A. Grice, manager of the Charlotte branch. A R. Brown Bill to Come up Soon.

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 6.—A measure providing for the disposition of the estate of an insolvent debtor under a voluntary deed of trust or deed of assignment for the benefit, introduced by Senator Brown, of Rockingham, and referred to judiciary committee number one, is expected to come up for action on the floor of the Senate this week. It was stated here.

Upon the execution of a voluntary deed of trust or deed of assignment for the benefit of creditors by an insolvent debtor, according to the measure's provision, he would be required to file with the trustee or assignee a schedule giving an account of his creditors, an inventory of his estate and subscribe to an oath that his statement is correct and that he has in no way attempted to defraud his creditors.

WOULD ERECT MEMORIAL AT THE "BLOODY ANGLE"

North Carolina Daughters Want Permission to Place Monument on the Gettysburg Field.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Assistant Secretary of War Wainwright has explained how the North Carolina Daughters of the Confederacy shall proceed to erect a monument or marker at the so-called bloody angle, in the Gettysburg national military park, at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. In a letter to Senator Simmons, in response to one from Mrs. Marshall Williams, of Faison, he said: "The association should submit a written application for authority to erect a monument or marker on the field, stating what it is intended to commemorate, and the spot upon which it is to be placed. A blue print design of the monument or marker, together with the proposed inscription thereon should also accompany the application."

It is added that under the laws governing the establishment of the military parks inscriptions for monuments, markers, or other memorials are to be compiled without censure or without praise. "Upon receipt of the foregoing papers the matter will receive consideration and the association advised as to the action of the department in granting the request."
