STONE MOUNTAIN AS PHOTOGRAPHIC PLATE. Figures of Lee, Jackson and Davis to Be Chiseled on Its Face. Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 28.—If the plans of Gutzon Borglum, well known sculptor, do not go awry, giant sized figures of Gen. Robert E. Lee, Jefferson Davis and Gen. Stonewall Jackson, heroes of the Southern Confederacy, soon will be outlined on the blank face of Stone Mountain, near Atlanta, as an everlasting memorial of the Lost Cause.

TAR HEEL GIRL IS CAUSE OF IT ALL. Young Atlanta Man Made to Apologize to Society Leader After Beating. Atlanta, Feb. 28.—Claire Frye, "Pup" McWhorter and J. E. Fincher, Georgia Tech football stars, were placed under \$200 peace bonds in municipal court here late today after Carl Davis had told the court how the three college students and Henry Lyons, a young clubman, had taken him from an apartment house early Saturday, thrashed him and compelled him to apologize to Miss Mildred Baswell, prominent society girl, for an alleged insult.
