**Methodist Ministers Are Rapped by Mr. Grant.**

New York, April 8.—The Rev. Dr. Percy Stickney Grant, rector of the Protestant Episcopal church of the Ascension, in a sermon today characterized as "chillish" recent action of the state Methodist Ministers' association in forbidding future addresses before it by persons whose views conflicted with the Methodist doctrines. The resolutions were adopted a few days after Dr. Grant had addressed the conference.

"When I addressed the conference, I told them when a Protestant Episcopal minister is ordained he is not obliged to pledge himself to the creed but to preach from the Scripture as he interpreted it," Dr. Grant said.

"When I got through, an individual got up and took exception to my viewpoints. Then the meeting was adjourned without giving me a chance to answer him. This is not the right way to conduct a meeting, according to Hoyle."

"That is a childish religion that thinks it is going to protect its orthodox nature by not allowing anybody to come and talk to its ministers," he said. "The pulpits of Christ does not substantiate the fables that have tucked themselves under the wide robe of religion."

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
