McLEAN OPPOSED TO PROHIBITION LAWS

The National Committeeman From This State Says He Thinks Majority of People Want Prohibition.

Lumberton, June 4.—"I am unalterably opposed to modification of the Volstead law, as suggested by Governor Smith, of New York," declared A. W. McLean, democratic national committeeman for North Carolina, in reply to an inquiry by a Washington news agency.

Mr. McLean said that the overwhelming sentiment of the people of this State and of the United States is against any modification of either the 18th amendment or the Volstead Act and that they favor the strictest enforcement of the law as it now exists.
