



NO OFFICIAL REPORT OF SINKING OF SUB

Had Been Received During Day by Navy Department.—One Report Received Yesterday.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 29.-The Navy Department today had received no official report on the sinking of the submarine 0-5 in collision with the steamer Abanjarez at the Atlantic entrance of the Panama canal, since that of yesterday. The message to the Department yesterday said the submarine had been sunk early in the day, and that five men had gone down with the vessel. There has been no official confirmation of the reported loss of the five men in press dispatches, which said six others were missing, and that efforts were being made to save them by raising the submarine.
