FEDERAL WAREHOUSE ACT

Protects Farmers From Losses From Fraudulent Warehouse Receipts. Raleigh, Jan. 16.—(P)—The federal warehouse act, providing for the licensing and inspection of public ware-houses by government officials protects farmers from losses due to unsound or fraudulent warehouse receipts, declares the United States de partment of agriculture, in a department bulletin just received here.

The law applies to warehouses for the storage of cotton, grain, wool, tobacco, farmers' stock of peanuts, latebeans, dried fruit, and cane and maple

The department cites as a typical instance of such a loss that of a farmer who stored his year's crop with a 20.35; May 19.75; July 19.05; Oct. warehouseman. He received a warehouse receipt, which he sold to a grain dealer. When the dealer presented the receipt, and called for the delivery of the grain, the warehouse was emp-

The dealer then fell back on the farmer from whom he bought the receipt. The warehouseman was, of course, prosecuted, but, points out the bulletin, that did not pay the farmer for his grain,

"A review of the storage losses o the past ten years sows that in practically all cases the losses would never have occurred, if the warehousemen had been operating under the United States warehouse act." Under the law, the department

says, when a warehouseman applies for license, the warehouse and the operator are investigated, and the ware Chrisopher Sholes, inventor of the houseman is required to file a bond first practical typewriter and at before a license is granted. After one time editor of the Milwaukee being licensed the warsahouse and its being licensed, the warsehouse and its accounts are inspected periodically to show whether the requirements of the act are being met, and especially to make certain that the products covered by receipts are actually in the warehouse.
