VOTE ON AUTO LICENSE BILL NEXT THURSDAY

Passed Senate on Second Reading by a Vote of 34 to 14.

Raleigh, Feb. 5.—We'll filled galleries and 45 Senators were disappointed yesterday when a motion was passed making the bill to change issuance date of fiscal year a special order of business for Tuesday. Vote on the measure Thursday brought the first heated debate of the session and it passed on second reading 34 to 14 after a motion to table had been defeated 24 to 23.

Senator Royal, the barrister from Wayne, submitted an amendment yesterday, providing for payment of an additional 25 cents fee when the six months plates are secured. This fee, he explained, will take care of any expense the Department of Revenue will incur in changing the issuance date from the fiscal to calendar year. The 25 cent per plate fee will not apply except on plates issued between July 1 and December 31, 1927.

Both the bill and amendment will come up for final reading Tuesday and another forensic display is forecast. Senator Rivers Johnson made a rousing talk in behalf of the bill Thursday, pointing out that he is tired of the august body being charged with "gubber stamping" measures outlined in the budget. Johnson, and several colleagues, took the position that the farmers have more money in January than in July and also that the state will save money by securing more interest through early collection of license fees than expense incurred in changing plates.

SALISBURY MAN SAYS HE SAW OTTO WOOD

Talked to Fugitive While He Was Visitor in Rowan Capital This Week, He Asserts.

Salisbury, Feb. 4.—Otto Wood, elusive prisoner who a few months ago escaped from the state prison for a third time, was in Salisbury this week, according to Earl Swicegood, who says he knows the fugitive well and talked to him.

Swicegood says he tried to inform sheriff Krider of Wood's presence in the city but failed to locate the officer in time to effect an arrest. To Investigate Aiken Lynching Further. (By International News Service) Columbia, S. C., Feb. 5.—The form of Governor Richards' probe into the celebrated Aiken lynching case remained clouded in uncertainty today.

Following the recent failure of the Aiken county grand jury to indict members of the mob that lynched the three Lowman negroes following their acquittal of the murder of Sheriff Howard, the governor issued a statement declaring that he would "do all within my power to bring the guilty parties to justice." The governor has not intimated what form any new investigation will take. The Aiken lynching was the object of a lengthy probe by Ex-Governor McLeod before he relinquished the reins of the state government a few weeks ago.
