DUKE ENROLLMENT SHOWS INCREASE

Student Body Numbers 1.519—Others

May Enroll Later. Duke Nniversity, Sept. 29 .- Officials of Duke University have expressed themselves pleased with enrollment figures for the new term of 1927-28. Total enrollment for the year, according to a announcement made here today by Dean H. J. Herring, is 1,519. The incoming class of freshmen number 451. It is significant is considering these totals that recent improvements in scholastic standards have eliminated an element of the student body that heretofore

has been a factor. Particularly to be appreciated are considerable increases in the separate schools of the university. The School of law has started the year with an enrollment of 42 students, more than has been the case in the history of the school. With the acquistion of Judge T. D. Bryson, of Bryson City, distinguished barrister and prominent citizen, as professor of law, and other additions of importance, including W. B. Bolich, of Winston-Salem, Rhodes Scholar and former State Legislator from Forsyth county, it is assured that the law school at Duke University has a brilliant future.

The School of Religion, headed by Dean Edmund D. Soper, writer and theologian of international reputation, has a membership of 49 men, of which 13 are at Duke University for the first time. This number doubles that of the opening session of the school last Fall. The Graduate School, under super

vision of Dean W. H. Glasson, has an enrollment of 87 men, of whom 44 are new students. Teachers devoting themselves to special weekly courses number 15. New students of advanced academic standing total 88 and the entire num-

per of newcomers is 596.
