Asks For Release So He Can Devote Time Hereafter to Private Business. Washington, Oct. 15 .- Walter Per-Johnson, veteran pitcher of the Washington American league baseball club, has resigned from the team and President Griffith has accepted

the resignation. Johnson, who celebrated his 20th anniversary as a major league player this year, will be given an unconditional release at his . own request, provided waivers are obtained from other clubs of the league.

Unlike other stars of baseball who reached the heights of stardom only to pass their declining athletic years in the uniform of a minor leaguer the "big train" has decided to quit and go into business at a time when he thinks he still has a few victories left in his arm.

In a letter requesting his unconditional release, the Washington twirler expressed great regret at having to eave the team with which he has been associated during his entire score of years in mayor league pase ball, but realizing he cannot be rated as a star, he said "he simply did not want to be in the way next season."
