

HELMET FOUND IN SEPTEMBER

Was Picked Up at Railway | Are Due to System Used by Track at Better Hope But Woman Has Forgotten Exact Date.

Washington, Oct. 24.-(4)-The State department has received by mail from the consulate at Georgetown, British Guiana, a waterproof helmet of American manufacture, which may prove to be the elue to the fate of Paul Redfern, missing Brunswick-Brazil aviator. The helmet has been sent to Red-

fern's backers for possible identifica-

onsul said the helmet had been found near a railway track at Better Hope, braska. a few miles east of Georgetown, by Mrs. Ceceilia Josephs, some time during the week ending September 3rd. Her recollection was that three natives of the same vicinity had reported on August 28th having heard the motor of an airplane, the date indicating a possibility that the plane might have been Redfern's ship.

The helmet fastening bore the stamp of a Providence, R. I., concern. Mrs. Josephs, the consul said, had not revealed the fact that she had picked up the helmet for several weeks afterward, and did not recall exactly the day on which she found it, but was certain it was some time in the week ending September 3rd.

Redfern was last seen by a steamship from which he asked directions as to the nearest land, and which endeavored to direct him on a course that would have carried him to the coast of British Guiana in the vicinity of Georgetown,

"I think that if there were a law that three medical certificates would justify the putting away of a person who is in a hopeless position as regards life and death, it would be a very great improvement. It would only be humanity and common sense."

Soon afterwards he disappeared and after a few days had passed and he failed to return, she became susp cious. At her request her Durham at torney called the banking institution of Charlotte over long distance tele phone only to learn that the money had been withdrawn by Lofton.

Immediately legal steps were taker to apprehend him, if possible.
