George Fry, from Snow Creek, in this county, was in Danbury at Commissioners' Court, last Monday week. On his way home, while engaged in a horse-race, his horse fell, wounding Fry dangerously, and breaking the horse's leg and shoulder. Is it not sad when heavily burthened with whisky, to be on foot? The distance between the head and the ground is not so great as when on the back of a horse. Of all the curses which the Almighty permits to afflict the people of our county, whisky assuredly should stand at the head of the list.

The County Commissioners have licensed twelve retail liquor dealers in Stokes, with the expectation of increasing the county revenue. Does it do so? The tax to the county is \$300. If you will look at the jail fees, which are to be traced directly or indirectly to groggery, you will see that these twelve shops costs the county three or four times as much as they yield. They keep our jail and poor-house burdened all the time with inmates. Is there no hope for us? Must we go down into that degradation which always follow the excessive use of strong drink? Relieve us from this awful curse or we are a ruined people!

The colored school in Danbury is still in operation—setting an example of earnestness and wisdom that should be emulated by some white people we know of. A school, to be successful, should be regular. The assistance rendered by the State in this matter, is intended to encourage education. The State does not assume the responsibility of giving each child all the education it should have; but the parent is expected to manifest an equal

interest in his own child's welfare, and provide private schools when the public schools suspend. We hope our people will make an effort to open and patronize a private school in every neighborhood. There is no subject of more vital importance to those whom it is our duty to provide for than that of education. There is no sin of omission for which God will hold us responsible, more criminal in its character than a neglect of this important duty.
