Briefs of General News

TUESDAY, JULY 31.

A regular war has been inaugurated in Stevens county, Kansas, between the citizens of Wooddale and Hinton, growing out of the killing of sheriff Cross and five of his deputies, still continues; everybody in the towns of Wooddale and Hinton is armed and business is at a complete standstill.

An old stage driver in California committed suicide by sitting on a fifty pound can of giant powder and applying a match to the explosive; his body was blown to atoms.

Excitement bordering on a panic prevailed in the Chicago market for hog products yesterday, and there was a general decline in prices; wheat did not hold its own, and corn was weak and lower.

A terrible tragedy was enacted in a Pittsburg hotel yesterday morning; a young woman killed her husband and then killed herself.

A double soul race for the championship of the United States and \$2,200 a side, was rowed over the Saratoga course yesterday; McKay and Gaudaur were the winners by four to five lengths.

Three new cases of yellow fever at Manatee, Florida, making eight in all only one case at Plant City.

There is perceptible alteration in Gen. Sheridan's condition.

There was a sensational hanging at Columbus, Ohio, yesterday; the victim appeared on the scaffold dressed as a gentleman for an evening ball, and when the trap was sprung the straps came off his arms, and he made desperate efforts to pull the rope from around his neck; he died a terrible death.

Democratic gains are reported in Middle and West Tennessee. East Tennessee has gone Republican by the usual majority.

Dun's weekly review of trade represents the business outlook as encouraging with good crop prospects and a fair volume of trade; business failures during the past week 216, against 221 for the previous week.

A tenement house was burned in New York yesterday with terribly fatal results; thirteen people were burned to death, two were killed by leaping from windows, and six were badly burned that they will probably die.

Petroleum or natural gas has been discovered near Rome, Ga.

Sunday August 5. A destructive hurricane prevailed in Taylor county, Iowa, on Friday; houses were demolished, trees uprooted, and much other damage was done; so loss of life is reported.

Intense heat is reported from Illinois Indians and Iowa; a large number of persons have been prostrated, and several deaths are mentioned.

John Robertson, the veteran showman, died in Cincinnati yesterday morning; he was more than thirty years of age, and had amassed a large fortune in the show business.

No new cases of yellow fever at Plant City, Fla., and no change reported at Maunee since Friday.

Three more bodies were found yesterday in the ruins of the Bowery fire, New York—a woman and two men—making twenty dead in all.

The Georgia and South Carolina Senators called on the President yesterday, and extended to him and Mrs. Cleveland an invitation to visit the city of Augusta, Georgia, during the exposition to be held there this fall; the President was unable to give them a definite answer, but will do so in about ten days.

Charles M. Goodell, a well known newspaper man of New York, died on Wednesday last.

There was considerable activity in the Chicago wheat market yesterday and an advance in prices; but the other pits were very dull; provisions received fair attention, but an unsettled feeling prevailed.

The Hatfield-McCoy feud in Kentucky has created a reign of terror on the border, and everybody in that section is armed in anticipation of trouble from one party or the other.

A slight shock of earthquake was felt yesterday near Glasgow, Scotland.

Very favorable reports come from Alexandria relative to the Egyptian cotton crop.

A series of severe thunder storms visited New York and vicinity yesterday evening; many buildings were struck by lightning.

It is announced that the Emperors of Germany, Russia and Austria will have a meeting at some point on the Austrian frontier in the autumn.

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A spark from an engine caused a destructive fire yesterday in the village of Blackstone, Va., on the Norfolk and Western Railroad.

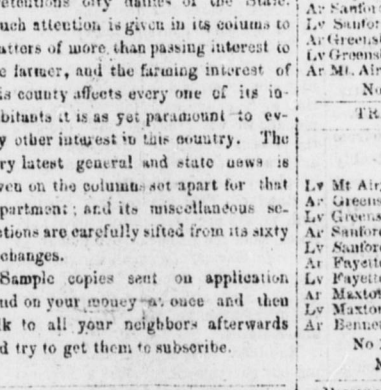
