ABOUT 291 FAIL TO PAY.

This is a Difference of 182 Over Two Years Ago, When 473 Were Disfranchised.

Two years ago there were 473 unpaid polls in Stokes county. This year there are only about 291, and this figure includes all those who are double-taxed and taxed by wrong names and those have died and removed to other counties. What proportion of these are Democrats and Republicans, cannot with any accuracy be determined, as both parties are making their usual claims. But it is certain that nearly 200 more votes will be cast at the next election over the vote of 1904, and for this reason there will be a closer fight and more hotly contested election than was the case two years ago.
