THE SCHOOL BOARD MEETS.

Colored Institute to Be Held—Contracts For School Houses to Be Let First Monday in August—Teachers' Salaries Fixed.

The Stokes County Board of Education met here Monday, present N. A. Martin, chairman; R. E. Smith and Prof. J. T. Smith, Superintendent and Secretary.

The Treasurer's report was examined and approved.

The Board ordered the Superintendent to locate school house sites where new houses are to be built, and let contracts on the first Monday in July.

An institute for colored teachers was ordered held, to continue one week, without cost to the county.

Geo. W. Bowman, E. F. Spainhour and Julius Mickey were appointed committeemen for the Pinnacle local tax district.

A petition was received from the citizens of Pinnacle asking the Board to build them a school house. The Superintendent was instructed to visit the district, confer with the committee, and report to the Board the first Monday in August.

An order was made that where any district will raise half enough money by private subscription to put two coats of lead and oil on the outside of their school house, the Board will pay the other half.

Ordered that no part of the school fund shall be used to pay for chopping wood in any district whatever, unless it be where there is a lady teacher and the scholars are too small to cut the wood. In this case the pay for the same to come out of the fund due the district having the work done.

The salaries for all the schools in the county were fixed, which will be published in the Reporter soon.

"INSURGENTS" IN EVIDENCE.

Stokes Republicans In Convention Monday Refuse to Instruct Delegates For Adams—List Of Delegates Appointed—County Convention Set For August Fourth.

The Stokes County Republican convention for the purpose of electing delegates to the State, Congressional and Judicial conventions was held in the court house Monday. The feature of the meeting was a clash between the Blackburn and Adams forces.

H. M. Joyce introduced a resolution endorsing President Roosevelt and the county officers, and instructing the delegates to vote for Adams for State Chairman. I. M. Gordon offered an amendment striking out the clause in favor of Adams, and on the vote the Blackburnites won by 13 to 8. The Blackburn men, who are dubbed the "insurgents," were headed by I. M. Gordon, R. P. Joyce and J. G. Falton. The Adams forces were led by H. M. Joyce, C. M. Jones and others.

Elsewhere will be found a report of the convention as furnished the Reporter by the Secretary.
