DAVIDSON'S FINEST FARM.

The Holt Heirs Sell For \$21,000—Has Yielded Thirty-Six Bushels Of Wheat Per Acre.

The historic Holt farm in Davidson county has changed hands. A Winston-Salem dispatch gives the following particulars of the farm and its recent sale:

The well known Holt farm in the Jersey settlement of Davidson county, has been sold by the Holt heirs to W. G. Penny and Frank Hargrave, of Lexington, the consideration, it is said, being \$21,000. The farm contains more than 600 acres, and is conceded to be the finest property in Davidson county.

It was owned before the Civil War by the late Dr. Holt, of Lexington. After the war it was sold and became the property of Gov. Thos. Holt, who improved it a great deal. It was his "pet" and he paid much attention to it, so that at the time of his death it was probably the finest farm in North Carolina. About 400 acres are now in cultivation and large yields are reaped from it. One field of about 150 acres has an average of wheat to its credit of about 36 bushels to the acre.
