Greensboro, June 15.—Rev. Dr. P. L. Groome, D. D., died here yesterday morning at 10:30, after a long illness with tuberculosis. He combated the disease manfully and no doubt prolonged his existence many years. Dr. Groome was perhaps 60 years of age and was an active minister of the M. E. church, South, for many years—until, in fact, his health gave way. He was a man of learning and some years ago wrote a book descriptive of his travels in the holy land, which attracted widespread attention. He leaves a family and numerous relatives in this country. Funeral services were conducted from West Market church this morning at 11 o'clock, interment following at Greene Hill.
