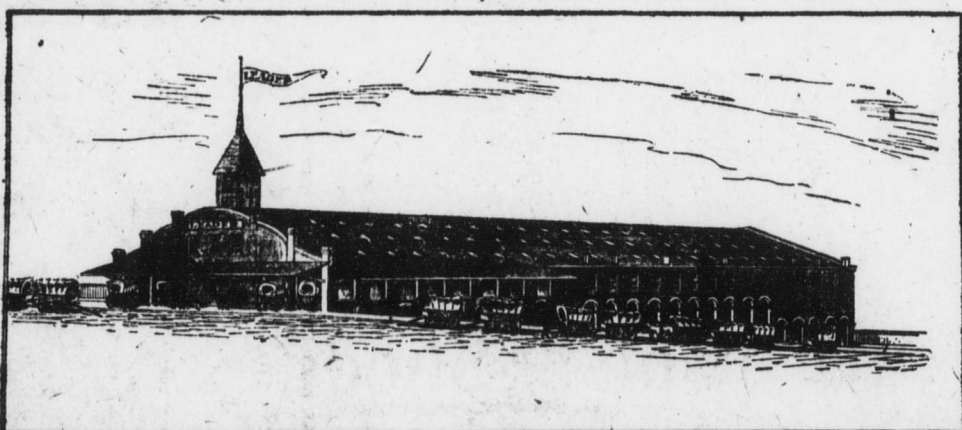
Post Cards of Local Scenery Now Ready At the Reporter Office.
