The End Came at His Home at Dalton-Only Two Members of the Family Present at the Time-Mr. Miller Was One of the Strongest Preachers and Most Consecrated Workers In the Presbyterian Church of the State.

Sad news came over the telephone from Dalton today, tel-Rev. Cornelius Miller was dead. several years in the practice of early this morning. Reverend Cornelius Miller was well known and greatly beloved by many of the people of this county, where he spent several years of his ministry.
