THE DRY PRIZERY RECEIVES MUCH TOBACCO

Sheds Are Full To Overflowing and Main Building Being Used To Store The Weed In — Hundred Thousand Pounds In One Day.

The dry prizery of the Stokes County Farmers' Union at Walnut Cove had probably the best business in its history the past week. Wagons loaded with the weed poured in from every section of the county, and on Thursday about one hundred thousand pounds of tobacco was taken in.

The immense sheds for storing the tobacco in are full to overflowing and the main building of the dry prizery is now being used as a storage house.

The fact that the management is pressed for room to care for the tobacco is ample evidence that the dry prizery has done better than was anticipated.

It was the intention of the management to close on April 27th, next Saturday, but the question of keeping open for another week is being discussed

by the directors. There is yet quite a lot of tobacco which the owners expect to place in the dry prizery.

Milton Barlow, of Stokes, Pardoned By Governor.

Governor Kitchin has granted a pardon to Milton Barlow, who was convicted in Stokes county at the fall term, 1911, of the crime of f. and a. He was sentenced to twelve months on the roads.

The reasons for pardon are as follows:

"On the recommendation of the trial judge, I pardon prisoner on condition that he abandon his co-defendant, properly provide for his family and remain of good behavior. It appears that prisoner's wife deserted him before his illicit relation with his co-defendant began."
