## A MONSTER MENACE.

The most hateful, vile, loathsome, dangerous foe that confronts the Stokes county home is the common house fly. There is no longer any question in the minds of intelligent people that a tremendous percentage of deaths are attributable to the visitation of the insect who carries on his feet and wings fatal germs which spread disease and death. Recent government statistics show that 80,000 babies die in the United States yearly and that the appalling mortality is traceable to flies. If any person will stop long enough to study the ancestry of the winged creature which scurries in the milk, walks on the butter, promenades anywhere and everywhere with its foul contamination, the result will be screens. The screen is the way to keep out flies, and the only way. It may cost a little money to screen every window and door in the house, but this will be cheaper than doctors' bills or tombstones.

## WHAT ABOUT FLORIDA.

Sometimes when tired of an old familiar object we discard it and take up a new one of a different pattern, which for a time pleases us with its novel and apparently improved features. But by and by we discover that the new object is defective in more particulars than the old one, and that we overlooked the good qualities in the old friend and the bad ones in the new. A Stokes citizen in good circumstances, surrounded with fine air, healthful climate, no mosquitoes, good land when treated right, and kind congenial friends, should hesitate long before plunging into a new untried country where distance lends enchantment to the view.

The evidence so far disclosed in the Allen trials fails to convince that the newspapers overdraw the devilish character of the assassins who wiped out the Hillsville court. All peaceful people wish that justice may be satisfied in the disgraceful affair, and justice's satisfaction can only mean that the clan of murderers must be removed from society so effectually that the memory of their passing may be a fearful deterrent to all those who hold themselves superior to law. Carroll is not the only county in Virginia or North Carolina where clans exist who have a contempt for established order. The electric chair is the medicine for hoodlums and cut-throats who prey upon innocent people.

## WILL GO TO JURY WEDNESDAY.

**Final Arguments of the Ten Attorneys Will Begin Today. Then Judge Staples Will Charge the Jury.**

Wytheville, Va., May 12.—Floyd Allen's jury was today instructed by the court and tomorrow the final arguments of attorneys on both sides will begin. Ten lawyers in all will speak in prosecution and defense of Allen's part in the Hillsville court house assassination March 14 when the judge, prosecutor, sheriff, a juror and a bystander were killed.

The summing up probably will take two days. The case may not go to the jury before Wednesday. Claude Allen, Floyd Allen's son, also indicted for five murders in the same shooting, will be placed on trial next according to the plans of the prosecution.

There was talk today of an attempt to compromise the other cases, though it is admitted any moves in that direction would be guided by the result in Floyd Allen's trial.

Several from here went to Donnaha Sunday to see the high water that washed away the big iron bridge.

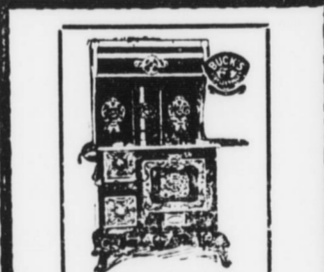
Mr. Joe Holland visited at Mr. Gordon's Sunday.
