## PREPARING FOR THE WORSE.

Nobody in the world can safely figure on the weather. The incoming summer may be as dry as last, or heavy rains may prevail throughout the year, notwithstanding the past winter and spring have been exceptionally wet. However, the signs point to droughty conditions again, and those farmers who are plowing their lands as deeply as two miles can break it, and who are cultivating their crops frequently, according to the directions laid out by the demonstration instructions, will be best prepared for whatever conditions prevail. A field broken eighteen inches deep, even if on a steep hillside, will not wash, while the same land will produce a good crop in the driest weather.

From reports received, nearly all farmers are using tobacco planters now, and not waiting for seasons to set out plants.
