LETTER FROM A. S. JACKSON

New York Man Writes Of Things In Stokes As He Sees Them From a Distance.

Danbury Reporter, Danbury, N. C. Gentlemen:

In a recent issue of your paper I saw some one has suggested the name of John W. Hall for your next Representative in the North Carolina Legislature.

Mr. Hall and I were school mates, and it is a source of pleasure to me to see his name mentioned in your paper as a prominent candidate for that important public office. I am not a voter in your community, but I can sympathize with your people and the progressive spirit that is animating you wherever the welfare and interest of your community is at stake. I know Mr. Hall intimately, and I believe you could better trust your local legislative duties than to your district will make no mistake in putting Mr. Hall's name on the ticket this fall.

I read the Reporter each week, gleaming the bits of news from both Stokes and Surry. I like to read of your road improvements, for along this line you certainly have cause to complain, but not alone in Stokes are your roads in a menacing condition and bridges few, but in a number of adjoining counties the traveling public fare equally as bad. The people of your county deserve credit for the work they have done along this line of improvement.

Another forward movement in Stokes, along with other counties, is the organization of the Corn Clubs and Girl's Canning Clubs. The scientific methods of farming taught the children in the above work is only infinitesimal. It is difficult to have a large percentage of all these farmers adopt any new methods for raising corn and tobacco, but the boys succeed with the "Vermont Patch" is an object lesson that

cannot be overlooked by the father.

Scientific methods applied and up-to-date machinery used on a farm in North Carolina will produce as good results as can be had from any State in the Union and any young man who anticipates farming as a profession makes a mistake in going West or to Florida.

I am sorry to see a few sluggish delegates from North Carolina still bowing for Roosevelt, especially from delegates. For the last 20 years the Southern people have practically no voice in the selection of a President. Neither have the Southern Congressional Representatives gotten through much important legislation and I believe the fault is entirely their own. It has been said of individuals that only a fool is always right, yet generations past and still we have the "good South." It seems to me however that there is something wrong with the political switch made in the South, her progress politically is fettered and bound by prejudice and personal grievances which are of half century standing; but the dawn is breaking and with the constant influx of capital, the greater need for employment and the development of her natural resources by scientific management she will again weigh evenly, both politically and principally, with any part of Uncle Sam's great farm.

Each sample or exhibit must weigh as much as five pounds, and not more than eight pounds.

Tobacco must be on the grounds not later than Monday, September 30th, 1912.

All tobacco placed on exhibition and premiums awarded under same conditions that apply to all other products.

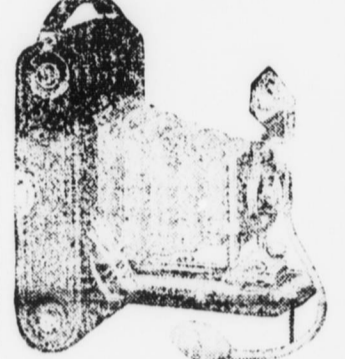
