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FINISHES 7TH YEAR

THE BANK OF STOKES COUNTY

NEW STORAGE HOUSE

FOR UNION DRY PRIZERY

To Be Erected At Walnut Cove At Once—Will Contain About 10,000 Square Feet of Floor Space.

The directors of the Farmers' Union for Stokes County have decided to increase the capacity of the storage house at their dry prizery at Walnut Cove and to that end work will begin next week on a shed which will contain about 10,000 feet of floor space. The new shed will be nearly one-third larger than the present one.

Mr. R. H. R. Blair, of Danbury, has the contract for the work and will leave Monday for Walnut Cove, where he will begin work at once.

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MR. KURFEES WRITES

ABOUT THE CONVENTIONS

Wants Stokes Republicans To Know About the Fraud Practiced At Charlotte As Well As At Chicago. Mr. Editor:

In a recent correspondence in your paper the writer has emphatically contended that no Republican should be bound by the action of the Chicago Republican convention, held last June, since fraud was rampant in practically all of its proceedings. But we find recently that Chicago is not the only place fraud can be perpetrated. The recent so-called Republican convention held in Charlotte Sept. 4th, is evidence that such tactics are now being practiced at home. I am anxious that the Stokes county Republicans know how the will of the people all over North Carolina was thwarted by the high-handed methods at Charlotte, and I therefore attach herewith a clipping from the Greensboro News which gives a part of the fraudulent program. This clipping is a statement issued by the committee, representing the progressive Republicans, which met in Greensboro Sept. 10th to confer with a committee of the Progressive party. After reading this statement I want every honest Republican in Stokes county to stop and think—ask yourself the question—should I be honest in politics as well as in business? If so, how can I support the ticket nominated at Charlotte? Remember now, it was not men belonging to the Progressive party who were kicked out at Charlotte. It was men who were life-long Republicans yet, but simply because they will not vote for Mr. Taft, they are kicked out, and had to see their respective counties misrepresented instead of represented. Let us all be Republicans in the true sense of the word and repudiate such bossism by voting for

Roosevelt and Johnson and the State Progressive ticket.

The statement referred to above follows:

"We call the attention of the people of the state to the fact that the state committee in making up the temporary roll of the delegates at Charlotte committed more flagrant crimes against the rule of the people than did the national committee at Chicago. The national committee at Chicago unseated enough regularly and legally elected delegates to give a majority to Taft. There it was necessary to unseat only 76 delegates to accomplish this dishonest purpose. Here it was necessary to unseat 800 delegates to defeat the will of the people. To carry out the machine program it was necessary for them to out Herod Herod and they did it.

"The state committee decided every contest, without regard to its merits, against the expressed will of the people. They seated in many counties only one or two delegates, those who would agree to vote for the machine program, and denied seats to all others. They denied seats to whole delegations from counties where there were contests, a few sample cases of which are here given:

"Buncombe county in a regular convention by a majority of over 3,000 votes elected 35 delegates to the state convention. Those defeated for delegates and their friends, 22 in all, held afterwards a rump convention and sent six delegates to the convention. The regular delegates came to Charlotte and were denied seats while the six rump delegates were seated, though they represented only 22 votes in all of Buncombe county. These six bolters cast the full 35 votes of Buncombe in that convention, which was more than there are Taft men in the county.
