Germanton, Jan. 8.—Last week Amos James went into a well for Mr. W. E. Willis to clean it out, when the rock wall collapsed and covered him up to his neck, his arms being pinioned by his sides. After about three hours' work James was rescued, not much the worse from his experience except a few bruises on his head produced by the falling rock. "Dick" declares he is thru cleaning out wells.

"Uncle Tom" is dead. Tom Goode, a noted character here, died Tuesday morning at six o'clock from paralysis. So passes another of the old antebellum darkies. "Uncle Tom" served as officers' cook during the four years' war between the States. The old man possessed a remarkable memory and was fond of relating his experiences during those stirring times. He usually attended the county reunions of the old vets of Forsyth and Stokes camps. After the war he became a blacksmith and worked at his trade until a few months since when his health gave way. His age was probably 75 years. He leaves a wife, two sons and a daughter. The funeral of this section of our old time folk will be held at the residence of the widow on Wednesday, Jan. 14, at 11 o'clock a. m.
