Our Forgotten State

There are less than 40,000 white people settled in Alaska today. Yet it is said that there are 50,000,000 acres of tillable land in Alaska capable of yielding rich abundance of hardy cereals, fruits and vegetables, and of sustaining great herds of cattle. The coal and oil and copper and iron and gold resources are said to exceed those of any other section of our country. Alaska is approximately one-fifth the size of the rest of the United States.

What has the United States Government done to advance the development of this wonderful land of untouched wealth? It has imported reindeer experimentally for the benefit of the Eskimos and permitted private enterprise to attempt secure a monopoly upon the mineral and agricultural resources. And now it has prevented the catastrophe just mentioned and taken the needed step for national development of the territory by providing for the construction of government-owned railroads on an adequate scale.
