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REPUBLICANS MEET

Resolution that No Officer Shall Hold More Than Two Terms, Repealed, and Chilton Is Renominated.

THE CANDIDATES

Proceedings of Saturday's Convention As Furnished By The Secretary.

According to notice regularly given, a convention of the Republican party of Stokes county, is regularly held at the court house in Danbury, on this the 1st day of August, 1914, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for the General Assembly, candidates for the various county offices, electing delegates and alternates to represent the county in the State, Congressional, Judicial and Senatorial conventions, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention.

The convention is called to order by C. M. Jones, chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of the county, at the hour of eleven o'clock a. m.

On motion N. O. Petree is elected permanent chairman and D. V. Carroll permanent secretary of the convention.

Upon a roll call of the election precincts of the county, the same are found to be fully represented.

Upon motion to repeal a former resolution passed by a former Republican convention of Stokes county, to the effect that no person should hold the same county office more than two terms in succession, the same was carried, and the resolution is repealed, and declared of no further force.

BURGLARS CAUGHT

Walnut Cove, Aug. 4.—Monday evening Mr. William H. Gentry, one of the oldest citizens of the county died at his home two miles north of here after a lingering illness of several months. He leaves to mourn death a wife, five sons and four daughters, Messrs. Sam Gentry, of Mt. Airy; Sterling Gentry, of West Virginia; Matt and Will Gentry, of Indiana, Mesdames W. S. Vaughn, of this place, C. H. Rayborn and J. H. Fulton of Greensboro; and Squire Venable, of Winston. Mr. Gentry was twice married, the first time to a daughter of the late Samuel Fulton and later to Miss Margaret Watkins. In his earlier years Mr. Gentry was prominently connected with public affairs, being for years sheriff of the county. He was a gentleman of the old school, highly esteemed by all who knew him and will be sadly missed in the community where he had spent the greater part of his life. The remains were laid to rest in the family cemetery Tuesday afternoon.
