MOONSHINERS BATTLE

Sharp Scrap in Carteret County In Which Officers Are Badly Wounded.

New Bern, Nov. 15.—Reports reaching New Bern are to the effect that Phil Gible and Thomas Dudley, the two men who were shot in a raid made a few days ago on an illicit distillery in Carteret county, are improving and that they will probably be out again within a few days. The fight between the officers and blockaders was thrilling. According to the story told of the affair, Deputy Sheriff West Odum, Phil Gible, Elijah Guthrie and Thomas Dudley, of Morehead City, got wind that a still was being operated on Adams creek, and, after securing a boat, sailed up to that point. Gible and Dudley first located the plant and with it were four of the operators. No sooner had the raiders put in their appearance than a hand-to-hand encounter took place. There were four desperate moonshiners against two officers and the latter were outmatched and attempted to get away. While they were fleeing, the blockaders turned loose the contents of their shotguns at them and both men were badly wounded. Following this the operators of the still succeeded in getting to the boat in which the men went to Adams creek and burned this to the water's edge. When Gible and Dudley failed to show up, a search was made for them and they were found, suffering terribly from their experience. They were taken back to Morehead City and placed in the hospital for treatment.
