EAT VEGETABLES.

Bulky, laxative foods as spinach, mustard, green peas, string beans, spring turnips, lettuce, radishes, etc., are necessary in the early spring diet. If you do not have them in your own garden and they are not to be found in the market, live on canned vegetables a while longer. If at this season you eat mainly vegetables and fruit, drink plenty of water and take daily exercise in the sunshine and open air, you will not be likely to have an attack of spring fever.
