

BIDS ASKED FOR

Forsyth Road Commissioners To Build Good Road To Stokes Line At Germanton.

BY SEPTEMBER 1ST

This will give another modern soil road all the way from Danbury to Winston-Salem—Bids To Be Filed By May 27th, 1915.

Danbury and this section of Stokes is soon to have another modern road all the way to Winston-Salem. The Forsyth county highway commissioners have asked for bids on the construction of a soil road from the Stokes county line at Germanton to David James, store, where the new road will intersect with the Rural Hall road going into Winston-Salem.

With the completion of this four and a half miles of road, on which bids are asked for, this section of Stokes will have a modern top-soil and sand-clay road all of the way to Winston-Salem by way of Germanton.

All bids on the construction of this road are to be filed with the Forsyth highway commissioners by May 27, and the contract for the work will call for its completion by Sept. 1st next.

Civil Service Examination To Be Held At Walnut Cove

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Stokes, N. C., to be held at Walnut Cove on June 26, 1915, to fill the position of rural carrier at Walnut Cove and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above mentioned county. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practical date.

Mr. Jesse Owens, of Francisco, and his young grandson, Master Ernest Collins, were both bitten by a rabid dog the past week, and they left immediately for Raleigh to take the Pasteur treatment at the State's hospital.

It is learned here that the dog which bit Mr. Owens and his grandson was bitten by a mad-dog about a year ago and had been confined for some time, but as it showed no signs of hydrophobia was released and last week the disease developed with result as above stated. The dog was owned by Mr. Owens and he no doubt regrets now that he did not kill the cur as soon as it was bitten.

Check Book Accounting.

Farmers who do most of their business by check can, with little effort, keep a very satisfactory account of the total farm receipts and expenses. Two things are essential for the success of this method:

First. All money received from any source, whether in cash or by check, should be deposited in the bank. By doing this the record of deposits will give the entire farm income. Most important of all, it insures against any moneys being spent without a check or stub to show for it.

Second. When drawing checks, care should be used to state for what purpose drawn. In this way the check stub will give an itemized account of the farm expenditures.

Under this system, checks for money for personal use are drawn in the same way as for any other purpose. At times the purchase of minor articles for farm use will require cash when the amount is so small that it is not desirable to use a check; therefore, to have an exact record a memorandum of the farm items which are paid out of the money checked out for personal use is needed. That is, these items should be charged to the farm, but they are really paid out of the pocket money which is charged on the check book to the personal account.

A memorandum of produce exchanged for groceries is also necessary, as there is no cash transaction in such cases.

In using this system it is better to have a large book of checks, which, if the farm business is of moderate size, the banker will gladly furnish with the checks numbered and the owner's name printed on them. A check book of this kind will generally last for a year, thus the advantage of having all the accounts in one book. The check book system as an aid to keeping financial accounts on the farm is very simple and will prove valuable to a large number of men whose business is adapted to it.

REVENUE OFFICER KILLED ON SHOOTING CREEK

Deputy Marshall Phlegar of Floyd Shot From Ambush After Destroying Still--Five Men Placed Under Arrest.

Smart, Va. Enterprise.

The following is an authentic account of the killing of Deputy U. S. Marshall Phlegar, and the arrests which followed the tragedy:

The party left the main creek and were making their way up a branch when they discovered evidence of travel up and down a cliff. Phlegar went ahead of his companions to see if the still was in operation and as he approached the place and discovered work in progress, he turned to motion to his companions to come up on the backbone of a ridge where the still was located. As he stepped back to beckon them he was shot from ambush, the assassin being hidden nearby. Three shots were fired, the last taking effect.

Phlegar fell instantly while Hopkins and Hall rushed to his side. Officer Hopkins reached him first and Phlegar remarked that "some one" had shot him. The bullet entered the right side above the hip, penetrated the cavity and grazed the spine, causing paralysis of the lower limbs. The wounded deputy was removed to the home of Luther Smith nearby. He did not suffer much, but an internal hemorrhage soon set in.

Phlegar was conscious and asked for his wife and baby. The officers had sent out messengers to notify the authorities at Floyd

and Dr. Dalton was sent to the scene, accompanied by Mrs. Phlegar and her child. Phlegar fought bravely until his wife arrived. He recognized her, called his baby to him and kissed it, and almost immediately thereafter became unconscious.

John Justice, Oscar Dillion, A. J. Dillion, Will Rakes and Buck Rakes were arrested near Shooting Creek, Floyd county, late yesterday afternoon and placed in the Floyd jail, charged with the killing, or being implicated, in the killing of Deputy United States Marshal G. P. Phlegar, who died from a bullet wound received when he was shot from ambush Friday afternoon. The quintet was arrested by U. S. Marshal T. G. Burch and U. S. Revenue Agent R. B. Sams and a part of their respective forces. The men probably will be brought to Roanoke, where they will be arraigned in the United States court for the Western Virginia district.

George Booth, on whose land the illicit distillery was discovered which was destroyed by Phlegar before he received his fatal wound, is in a hospital in Floyd. It is alleged he lost one eye and one arm from a dynamite explosion several weeks ago while dynamiting for fish on a creek near Floyd. It is thought he will be well enough to be taken to jail in a few days where he will be lodged on a charge of being implicated in the shooting of Phlegar.

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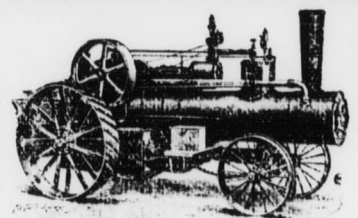
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
