Young Crawford Tuttle Is Injured When Machine Passes Over His Body.

REVIVAL CLOSSES

Walnut Cove, June 29.—A serious accident occurred on North Main street, near the residence of Dr. J. W. Neal, Monday afternoon when Crawford Tuttle, the sixteen-year-old son of Mr. Jas. T. Tuttle, who was riding a motor cycle, was struck by an automobile belonging to Dr. J. W. Slate which was driven by his son, Ralph. The car passed entirely over the young man, inflicting many painful wounds; however, it is thought that he is not injured seriously. The details of the accident are meagre owing to the fact that both the boys were very much excited and could not tell just how it occurred. The automobile and the motorcycle were both going in the same direction and it is supposed that the heavy dust and the noise of the two motors prevented either of the young men from detecting the danger. The motorcycle which is the same vehicle christened "Ford Colt" a few weeks ago was demolished entirely, and its parts scattered several yards in every direction.
