INC. RECORD.

Messrs. W. H. Davis and J. R. Voss, of Mizpah, purchased a 16-horse power Mogul and a No. 4 Geiser separator to begin the threshing season of 1916. During the 18 days that they have run the machine they have threshed 7,500 bushels of grain and before the season closes will very likely have reached 10,000 bushel mark.

The machine does excellent work, and at some places a maximum amount of three bushels per minute has been threshed. On July 13 the largest amount for any one day was threshed—6124 bushels. Of course it is no easy job to feed and measure this much wheat in a day, and it may not be out of place to say the feeding was done by J. H. Hampton and D. O. Slate of Mizpah and by Charlie Carroll of the same place.

This threshing outfit has proved decidedly that tractors can be used successfully in Stokes, and no doubt others will soon be brought into the county as they can be used not only for threshing, but also for hauling, sawing, plowing, road dragging and other things.

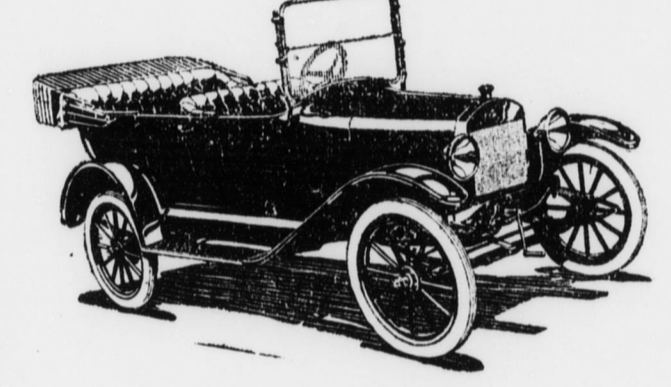

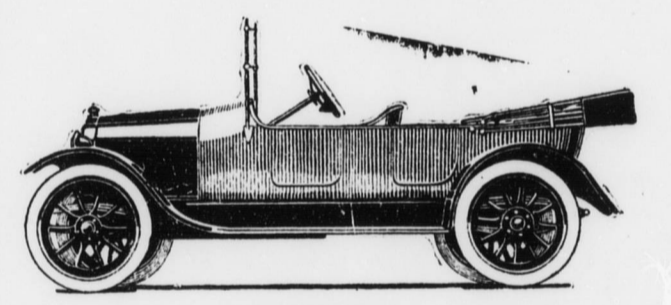
