campaign to permit no salary increase by the legislature if in his power to prevent. But "bullies" in the estimation of Tom Boyle and Representative King probably feel the same way about it now.

Representative Moore of Martin, recently introduced a bill in the House entitled "An Act to create an advisory commission to investigate and report upon the question of freight rate discrimination and the question of the development of waterways." The bill, introduced by Governor McLean, would create a special commission composed of 12 members, six from each branch of the General Assembly and six from business men and shippers, who would be authorized to work in cooperation with the Corporation Commission towards the adjustment of exorbitant freight rates. The members of the commission would receive the same per diem and mileage as members of the General Assembly and have the right to expend the sum of \$25,000 for purposes of investigation. This General Assembly does not appear to think well of legislative commissions, but the Governor's prestige may null the Moore bill through. Mr. McLean promised to aid in the development of the State's waterways during the primary campaign last summer and he wants to make good that pledge.

The State wide game bill is having rough sledding. It has been "killed and cuffed around" from the present Representative Wade of New Hanover and Senator White of Scotland, dropped it into the legislative basket. The proponents of the "game bill" do not appear to be any nearer an agreement. They were three weeks ago and the proposed measure has been placed in the custody of a "special committee" with the view to ironing out the differences. It is expected to lob up again when the average farmer in the Assembly least expect it.

That the number of judicial districts will be increased is a question yet undetermined. A bill by Senator Dunlap, which would authorize the Governor to appoint special judges to relieve congestions, has presented a brand new issue in the fight for four additional districts. The district bill is yet in "status quo" and there it may remain for keeps.

of the State State Normal School at Winston-Salem to the Winston-Salem Teachers' College; to amend statutes relating to licensing of pharmacies and other institutions; to amend statutes relative to foreclosures of mortgages on personal property; to amend statutes relating to the North Carolina agricultural society; to amend statutes so as to amend their corporate names; to amend statutes of North Carolina and laws relating to motions and orders for removal in civil actions; to amend statutes so as to amend the State of North Carolina duty with the State Treasurer to extend the time for registration of State Grants; resolution requesting the Attorney General to investigate the fertilizer products company; to prohibit the careless and imprudent use of dumping sites along State highways; to amend chapter 87 of the public laws of 1921 entitled an act to encourage the cooperative marketing of farm products and to authorize the incorporation of cooperative marketing associations so as to provide for withdrawal of members.

Fredrickburg, Va., Feb. 17.—E. N. Helsabeck, farmer of Stevensburg, King and Queen county, planted one bushel of Laredo beans last year on five acres and harvested seventy-eight bushels. The beans sold for \$7.50 per bushel, making a total of \$585 for the crop of five acres of land. About 1,000 bushels of these beans were raised in King and Queen and William Counties last season, most of which sold for \$7.50 per bushel.

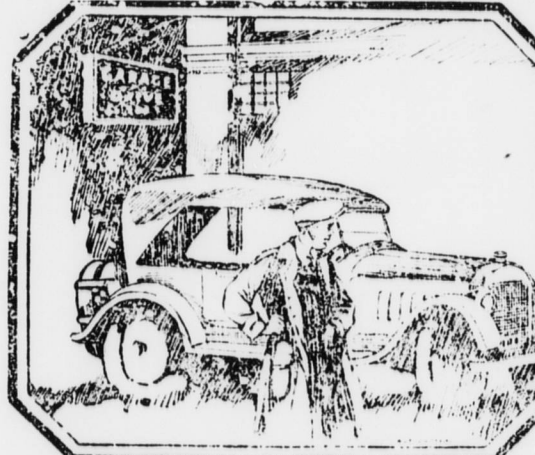
