Lamb Losses Due
To Poor Feeding
Raleigh, Feb. 23.—Lamb losses in
this state are largely due to errors
in feeding, and mostly by the lack
of appropriate feeds for the ewe be-
fore lambing and for both the ewe
and lamb after lambing.
'Ewes that come through the winter
in poor flesh can't raise a
strong thrifty lamb. This is too
evident to need data to verify it,"
says G. P. Williams, Sheep exten-
sion specialist for the State College
of Agriculture. "This condition is
proven beyond doubt by the fact
that lambs arriving after grass
starts grow off promptly. Ewes that
eke out the winter on hays of the
meanest kinds and on cottonseed
hulls or that graze the stark weath-
er-beaten landscape can score no suc-
cess at lambing time.
'Much of the lamb losses attrib-
uted to cold weather is in fact
due to a badly nourished and thin
ewe and to a weak lamb that can't
help being weak and flimsy under
such circumstances.
The foundation of success with
ewes at lambing time rests on prop-
er feeding through the winter cou-

plined on the Harvard Plan. The
Convention is for Sunday School
workers of all denominations, and
it is expected that it will be the
largely attended Sunday School
meeting ever held in the State.

Good Profits Secured
From Roadside Market

Raleigh, Feb. 23.—Surplus pro-
duce from the garden, orchard and
poultry yard may be sold to advan-
tage by using a small roadside
market. This is especially true if
one lives on one of the main high-
ways where travel is heavy.
S. C. Clapp, superintendent of the
Mountain Branch Experiment Sta-
tion near Asheville, tried out this
plan last summer and sold over \$400
worth of surplus produce right at
the market in addition to making
orders for large deliveries to be
made from the farm. Mr. Clapp
made a little stand just high enough
for one to drive by and look over
the produce comfortably without
getting out of the car. The stand
had two shelves, so that the lower
one might be used for protecting
leafy vegetables from the sunlight.
The produce was tied up in nice
bundles and well arranged in small
barrels with the price of each
article on each container. A small
box was placed for the change and
it was left to the honor of the buyer
to make his own change.
Mr. Clapp hardly ever visited the
little stand except to replenish what
had been sold. The produce was
placed only in the morning and the
money taken out late in the evening.
Some evenings Mr. Clapp found as
much as twelve dollars in his box
and there was never a mistake of
over a few pennies caused by diffi-
culty in making change.
"The people seemed to appreciate
my trading them," says Mr. Clapp.
"Many of those driving by stopped
and looked over the material and
would then drive in to the farm and
buy a larger amount than I had on
display. I sold apples, egg plants,
bell peppers, radishes, peaches, grapes
and other produce."
Mr. Clapp believes that the farm-
er who has a surplus of produce
might well use this plan to adver-
tise this summer and dispose of his
material right at his front gate.

Club boys and girls in Catawba
county shipped twenty birds to F.
J. Gormican, of Tampa, Florida, to
be used for exhibition purposes.
These birds will be shown in Florida
and Cuba. The club members also
shipped 600 eggs for hatching pur-
poses and only two were broken, re-
ports County Agent J. W. Hodricks.

Dairy cattle may be improved by
the use of a good herd sire. Dairy
extension workers of State College
are planning a careful campaign to
promote this idea during the present
year.
