Why Gasoline is Higher

Many people imagine that gasoline prices are raised or lowered at the pleasure of Rockefeller and the Standard Oil Company. While nearly everyone is affected by the recent rise in prices, few have any idea of the reason for the advance. There is a very good reason, as anyone familiar with the oil industry understands, and that is simply the old law of supply and demand. Nothing else controls the price to any appreciable extent.

For a long time gasoline prices have been quite low, even with the road tax imposed by many states added. But the cheap gasoline will soon be a thing of the past, unless highly productive new oil fields, now unknown, are discovered.

Owing to the drilling of tremendously productive new wells at Long Beach, Santa Fe Springs and Huntington, California, the Burbank field in Oklahoma and the Powell field in Texas in 1923, to mention only a few of the principal ones, crude oil production of the United States mounted unprecedented heights, reaching at its peak the enormous total of 2,326,514 barrels in a single day.

Some very productive new fields were also opened up in 1924, but all have now fallen off greatly, so that at present the daily production of the United States has decreased to approximately 1,320,000 barrels, which is not sufficient to supply the demand, so that the accumulated

surplus is being drawn upon. No important new fields are in sight to offset this decline and stocks of crude oil now above ground are only sufficient for 157 days' supply.

Due to the increased number of automobiles and greater use of crude oil as fuel, the demand for 1925 will probably be from 15 to 20 per cent greater than last year. On the basis of the known facts, a scarcity of oil is imminent, hence the higher price.

Better prices, however, will stimulate drilling and it is probable that important new fields will be opened up, but unless this happens, higher gasoline prices may be expected for an indefinite period.


